## McQuaid Whips Irish In Basketball 68-56

McQuaid Jesuit High School's sharp-shooting basketball team led from the start last Friday night and went on to hand Aquinas Institute a 68-56 setback at the old R.I.T. gymnasium.

The Knights posted their first win of the season while the Irish dropped their second. Both teams have had two outings in the current campaign.

McQuaid led 16-8 after the first eight minutes and boosted it to 42-25 at halftime. Aquinas outscored the Knights 9-6 in the third quarter but ran out of steam in the last period when McQuaid added 22 points to Aquinas' 16. Only consolation for the Irish was an outstanding backward effort during the second half, although being outdone on the offensive boards during the last quarter.

McQuaid finished with a respectable 38 per cent from the field. Aquinas had 16 of 55 shots on target for a final tabulation of 28 per cent. From the free throw line the Knights hit 68 per cent of their attempts to 56 per cent for the Irish.

Mike Ryan set the scoring pace for McQuaid with 26 points, eight from the charity stripe, while teammate Tom Combs chipped in 17 and Ray O'Neill added 10, eight from the free throw line. For the losing Irish, Tom Rowling collected 16 points and Steve Centron contributed 15, the only Aquinas players in double figures.

Coach John Uriah, in his first year coaching at Aquinas, will be looking for his initial victory tonight when the Irish meet certain Edison Tech on the old R.T. hardwood. Game time is 8:15 p.m. with a junior varsity preliminary at 7 p.m.

## Kings Fall to Mooney

League play continues for the Kings tonight (Friday) when they play Franklin on the Kings' court at 8:45 p.m. Tomorrow night, the Kings make their first away-from-home appearance of the season, playing at Marshall at 8:15 p.m. On Friday, Dec. 19 the Kings will be at McQuaid to play the Knights at 8:45 p.m.

# Texas Finishes 1st In Fowler Ratings

Starting the final period with backs to the wall in hostile country, the Texas Longhorns kept their cool to overcome a 14-0 deficit and nip the Razorbacks of Arkansas, 15-14, in the grand finale to the regular college football season.

The win boosted the Longhorns into first place in Fred Fowler's College Football Ratings for the second time this season, and gave them the Southwest conference crown plus the host team berth in the Cotton Bowl.

In posting their 19th game without defeat and their 10th victory of the year, the Texans joined Penn State, Southern California, San Diego and Toledo in completing regular season play without a loss.

While Texas nudged Arkansas from the unbeaten ranks, San Diego State went a step beyond by opening post-season major competition with a 23-7 triumph over Boston University in the Pasadena Bowl.

Regardless of polls, plaques, etc., the centennial year's true national champion will be determined by results in the Cotton Bowl, Rose Bowl and Orange Bowl.

## Jesuits Ask Advice ... And They Get It

Baltimore (RNS)—Jesuits got more than they bargained for recently when they invited black leaders to tell them how best "to serve the needs of the community."

They were told, bluntly, "You ought to abolish these all-white schools of yours. It's a travesty that in this day and age we tolerate them."

The curt suggestion to abolish these schools was made by John O. Hopkins, as he addressed a group of Jesuits of the Maryland Province of the Society of Jesus, which has 5 million black people living within its boundaries.

As reported in the Jesuit magazine, America (Dec. 6), Hopkins' advice was echoed, in part, by another black leader, Walter Carter, director of community organization for the Baltimore Model Cities Program.

Saying that the Jesuits "can be a catalyst" in the Catholic Church," he urged them to "move your schools to the ghetto and rename them for Nat Turner, Marcus Garvey, W. E. B. DuBois, Frank Robinson, Earl 'the Pearl' Monroe—and anyone else these kinds want to name them for." "You've always been kind," he added. "Now you want to flex your spine."
