Bishop Kearney staged a second half rally, led, and then were rallied upon themselves as Notre Dame of Batavia won its sixth game of the season, 65-62 in Batavia last Saturday.

It was the two teams' second meeting during the holidays and revenge was on Irish eyes right off the bat as they led the Kings 15-8 and 32-29 at the first two quarter stops. Then, the Kings jumped ahead in the opening minutes of the third period, and lengthened it to seven points. Kearney led 44-40 at the end of the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter, with thirteen seconds remaining, Kearney giant, Mike Goonan, concluded a seventeen point effort by committing his fifth foul of the ballgame. Paul Riesenberger was sent in as Goonan's replacement. Batavia scored and it was all tied up 56-56. Kearney took the ball out and called timeout. Four seconds were left. Larry Rogers got the throw in and fired a pass from half-court to a striding Paul Riesenberger, who leaped and layed the ball in. The buzzer had sounded, either before or as the shot was going through. Kearney fans and players were in hysterics, but Batavians were happy too. Kearney thought they won, while Notre Dame believed they tied it and talked over their plans for overtime.

A three minute overtime period was played and Kearney did its best. Fouls resulted and Jim Zalacca hit on seven of eight free throws to become the hero for the hometowners.

Notre Dame's record is 6-1, while Kearney's is 3-4.

Time Face In Repeat Of Blaine

(Special to the Courier-Journal)

Albany — Gov. Rockefeller's call for a referendum to repeal the Blaine Amendment is a hopeful step, of the beleaguered school systems may be phased out of their financial straits before the three year term of the restrictive Blaine Amendment.

That's how Father I. Shanahan, president of the State Council of Diocesan Superintendents, commented on the request for a referendum to repeal the 76-year-old law which bars non-public schools.

"In view of the gravity of the financial problems for the state schools, and the fact that these schools, all too often, have been the cause of financial crisis for parishes," he said.

Father Shanahan noted that the current legislature, a date in 1967 during consideration of a new state constitution — be accomplished in less than a year.

Father Shanahan said that more than three quarters of a million non-public school children represent 20 per cent of the state's enrollment, face a financial crisis.

"The fiscal crisis is not just developing for a solution."

He called for significant action from the present legislature "which would meet the needs of both the state and the parishes."

Gov. Rockefeller in his State of the State message called for repeal of Blaine and directed a commission to study the system to include consideration of the plight of the non-public schools.

The governor's call for repeal found support from the leading Republicans in the legislature, Sen. Majority I. W. Brydges, who renewed support for Blaine's repeal and that attempts to provide assistance to parishes may come out of the 1970 session.

An attempt was made to repeal the Blaine Amendment in a proposed reversion of the entire state constitutional commission. The commission called for repeal of the Amendment, but a number of controversial issues were included in the package. In a referendum, 1967, the voters recommended to retain the Amendment.

Opponents of state aid to public schools repeatedly have rejected the proposal by a 3 to 1 margin in the legislature. The proposal was not a clear-cut repeal of the Blaine Amendment, but a number of other issues.

Gov. Rockefeller's request came in a section on education in which he called for an increase in the state aid to public schools to \$900 a pupil.
