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Time Factor In Repeal Of Blaine

Albany — Gov. Rockefeller's call for a referendum to repeal the Blaine Amendment is a hopeful step, of the beleaguered school systems may be phased out, seriousness of their financial crisis before the three-year term expires, the restrictive Blaine Amendment.

That's how Father I. Shanahan, president of the State Council of Diocesan Superintendents, commented on the request for a 76-year-old law which bars non-public schools.

"In view of the gravity of financial problems for the state schools, and the fact that many of these schools could very well be moved to parochial schools."

Father Shanahan noted that the legislature, a date in 1967 during consideration of a new state constitution, be accomplished in less than a year.

Repeal of Blaine needs the current legislature, and the next legislature, and a referendum by a state referendum in the fall.

Father Shanahan said that more than three-quarters of a million non-public school children represent 20 percent of the state's enrollment, face a financial crisis.

"The fiscal crisis is not just developing for a solution."

He called for significant support from the present legislature "which would meet the needs of both the state constitutions."

Gov. Rockefeller in his State of the State message called for repeal of Blaine and directed a commission studying the system to include consideration of the plight of the non-public schools.

The governor's call for repeal found support from the leading Republicans in the legislature, Sen. Majority I. W. Brydges, who renewed support for Blaine's repeal, and that attempts to provide assistance to private schools may come out of the 1971 session.

An attempt was made to repeal the Blaine Amendment in a proposed revision of the entire state constitutional commission. The commission called for repeal of the Amendment, but a number of controversial issues were included in the package. In a referendum, 1967, the voters recommended to retain the Amendment.

Opponents of state aid to non-public schools repeatedly have rejected the proposal by a 3 to 1 margin. The rejection of the proposal is the Blaine Amendment, but the aid to non-public schools as consistently have been rejected by a clear-cut vote. Blaine Amendment alone has caused a number of other issues.

Gov. Rockefeller's request came in a section on education in which an increase in the cell aid to public schools of \$900 a pupil.
