

New Song Takes Poke at Super-Patriots

Credence Clearwater Revival has become America's version of the Beatles. Like waves constantly pounding the sand, hit after hit rolls from the boxes of the group's electric and acoustical guitars. Using basic hard rock as its starting point, Credence Clearwater has struck oil in a music land that often feels gas is really better.

"Fortunate Son" is one song in their latest pair of hits. While "Down on the Corner" — their other chart climber — is a pleasant, bouncy description of life in some bayou town, "Fortunate Son" lashes out violently against hypocrisy in America today.

"Some folks are born made to wave the flag, oh they're red, white and blue." There's nothing especially wrong with being a patriot, is there? But according to the song, some "super-patriots" spend much of their time pointing their flag-draped cannons at others.

The song sounds pretty bitter. It seems that if you're going to attack the flag-wavers, you'd better be prepared for the hurricane of protests that arises from the wind stirred by that flag-waving.

Yet the singers willingly attack.

But the song isn't as radical as it might sound, even though it seems to be accusing some people of singing no "Hail to the Chief" but "Hail to the Chief." For all that, "Fortunate Son" is probably not a Communist plot.

People who make a show of waving the stars and stripes, who put "America — Love It or Leave It" bumper stickers on the backs of their red, white and blue Javelins — these people don't have a monopoly on patriotism. Patriotism like anything else, can be used or abused.

It seems that some folks use patriotism for their own purposes and desires. But this is nothing new. Even way back, Samuel Johnson — looking at some of the people who wrapped themselves in his country's flag — said, "Patriotism is the last refuge of scoundrels."

When John Fogarty, Credence Clearwater's lyricist, says, "I ain't no senator's son," he could be echoing the eminent Doctor Johnson.

"Fortunate Son" is not attacking America; it's attacking problems in America. It's complaining about double

standards. For example, take those folks who "are born with silver spoon in hand. Lord, don't they help themselves!" The singers don't despise wealth, just as they don't condemn real patriotism.

Instead, they knock people who have money and then make a big show of 'poverty' in order to save on taxes. Well, after all, everyone cheats on taxes, right? So what's the problem?

Here's the point: on one hand, the song is telling us, you see people who demand that everyone follow a strict, narrow brand of patriotism, and who are open to no other viewpoints. On the other hand, you see some of these very same people trying to pull the wool over their "beloved" government's eyes by playing games with their tax returns.

The song asks: How are you supposed to react to that? The answer comes loud and clear: Just step back from that scene, smile and say, "I'm not one of those; I ain't no fortunate son."

"Fortunate Son" can rightly be considered an extreme song. It is, however, simply a reaction to extreme positions on the other side. The value of extremes is that when you know the two ends of a line, you can find where the center is.

Notre Dame Campaigns To Increase Student Body

Elmira — Notre Dame High School has embarked on a campaign to build the student body from this year's 570 to a capacity crowd of 750.

The initial goal is to increase next fall's freshman class by 24, to 200.

A financial report at a board of governors' meeting last Sunday led Principal Warren Tessier to comment "at this point we're holding our own for this year."

Tessier noted that increased enrollment would require a larger facility, but said the cost of added salaries could be offset if there was "a significant increase" in the number paying tuition.

John D. Frawley was named chairman of the board, succeeding Tessier. Louis J. Mustico became vice chairman, succeeding Frawley.

Student committees opened the recruiting campaign, visiting area parishes to talk with

eight and ninth graders. An open house will be held for parents next month. Group tours of the school will be scheduled, and registration for next year will take place March 14 and 15.

Fr. Dowhovich Succumbs at 86

Elmira Heights — Mass repose of the soul of Father Waldimir B. Dowhovich, 86, former pastor of St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Church here, was celebrated Jan. 7 at St. Mary's Church in Troy.

Father Dowhovich, pastor of St. Mary's, died there Jan. 3, 1970. He served the Elmira Heights church from 1939 to 1959.

Bishop Joseph Schmondiuk of the Ukrainian Diocese of Stamford (Conn.) officiated at the funeral Mass. Born in 1884 in the Western Ukraine, Father Dowhovich came to the United States in 1909, two years after his ordination.

MEMORIAL MASS FOR FR. STAUB

Rochester Branches, Catholic Central Union of America and National Catholic Women's Union, will observe the 47th anniversary of the death of Father Jacob Staub by attending the 11 a.m. Mass at Holy Redeemer Church this Sunday, Jan. 18.
