

St. Bernard's Lists Spring Curriculum For Priests-Alumni

A number of priest-alumni will be taking courses beginning Feb. 2 at St. Bernard's Seminary along with the regular students in a program of continuing education leading to the degree of Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.). The schedule for the spring semester includes courses by four professors who are new to the seminary faculty.

Dr. Henry Mitchell, Martin Luther King Jr. memorial professor in Black Church Studies at Colgate Rochester Divinity School/Bexley Hall, will offer a course entitled "The Black Bible and the Black Imagination." This course will analyze the characteristic elements of the use of biblical stories in black preaching, with special application to life-situations. (Friday, 1:30-3 p.m.)

Canon John Townroe, warden of King's College, London, England, and noted Anglican scholar, will offer the course "Christian Mysticism and the World Today," an attempt to relate the common theme that seems to exist in LSD, interest in astrology, "dropping out," pop culture, and interest in Eastern religions with the main current of the Christian mystical tradition. (Tuesday, 1:10-3 p.m.)

Msgr. Richard Quinn, formerly rector of St. Andrew's Seminary, will teach a course on "The Theology of Enthusiasm." Fringe movements in Church history of the "enthusiastic" type will be investigated, as well as certain individuals, such as Abbot Joachim, Mme. Guyon, and Dorothy Day, in an attempt to see what they have contributed to the main tradition of Christianity. (Wednesday, 1:10-3 p.m.)

Dr. Christopher Pino, clinical psychologist of the Orleans County Mental Health Clinic, will offer a course, "Pastoral Counseling." It will deal with basic techniques of counseling and the role of the clergyman as counselor. (Thursday, 3:10-5 p.m.)

Other courses being offered are:

Social Challenge of the Gospel, Father Sebastian Falcone, Thursday, 1:10-3 p.m.; Problems in American Catholic History, Father Robert McNamara, Wednesday, 1:10-3 p.m.; Social Work for Priests, Monsignor Francis B. Burns, Tuesday, 1:10-3 p.m.; Pre-Reformation Theology, Father Michael Smith, Wednesday, 4:10-6 p.m.; Emergence of Early Christian Theology, Father Edward Callens, Friday, 4:10-6 p.m.; History of the Liturgy, Monsignor Burns, Thursday, 1:10-3 p.m.; A Mission for America? Father Giovanni Montanari, Monday, 4:10-6 p.m.; Marriage Counseling, Father Joseph Cantillon, hours to be arranged.

In addition to the courses listed above, any other of the seminary courses are open to priests of the diocese without charge, whether they are working toward the B.D. or not.

Courses are also open to a limited number of laity and religious who meet the academic qualifications of a graduate professional school of theology.

Basilian Biography

K. of C. Plans Statewide Oratory Test

A total of \$4,700 in college scholarships will be awarded in a statewide oratorical contest sponsored by the State Council of the Knights of Columbus.

The topic is "How Does Youth View Authority?" The speech must be an original effort of the student and be between four and five minutes in length.

Any Catholic boy or girl, who is a state resident and who will graduate in 1970 is eligible. Applications are available from school principals or at the local Knights of Columbus Council.

Paul G. Rombaut, state chairman of the K. of C. Oratorical Committee, will supervise the contest in the Rochester Diocese.

Our Lady of Genesee Council 4812 will hold the local contest at Guardian Angels School Hall at 8 p.m. Friday, Jan. 30.

The state winner will receive a \$2,000 scholarship; second place, \$1,500 scholarship; third place, \$1,200 scholarship. Each of the other nine finalists will receive \$200 in U.S. Government Bonds.

The Bishop's talk encompassed three subjects: "Confused Catholics Today," "Christ Founded a Church with Authority," and "The American Conference of Bishops."

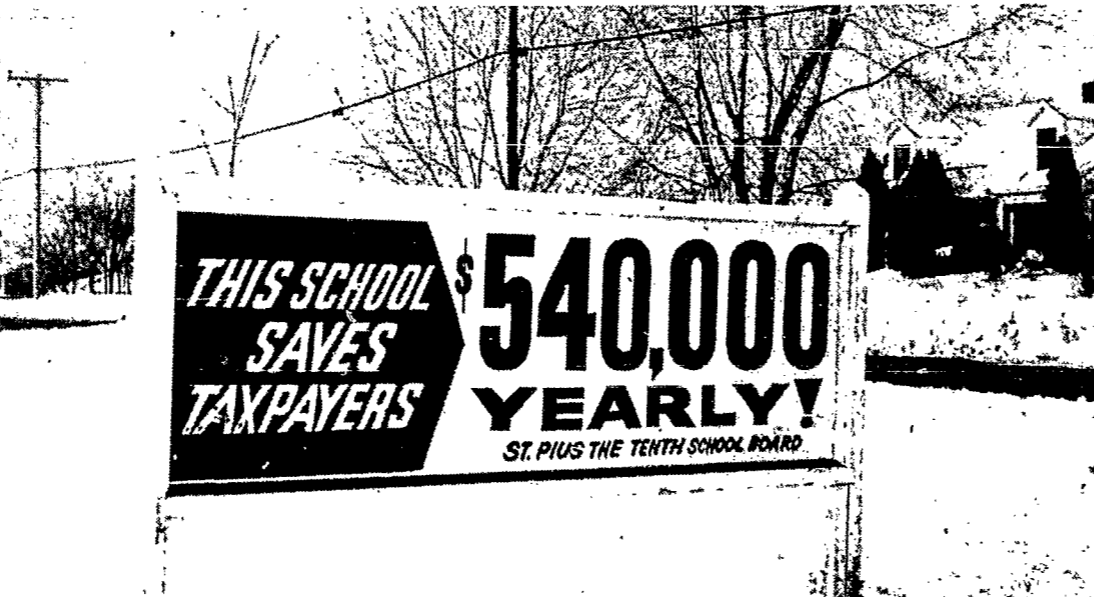
It was the first in a series of meetings sponsored by the Corning-Painted Post Committee for Adult Religious Education. Richard Wardell is chairman.
