Cardinal Mooney stayed close on the heels of first place Franklin in the City-Catholic League by trouncing Charlotte 66-25 last Friday.

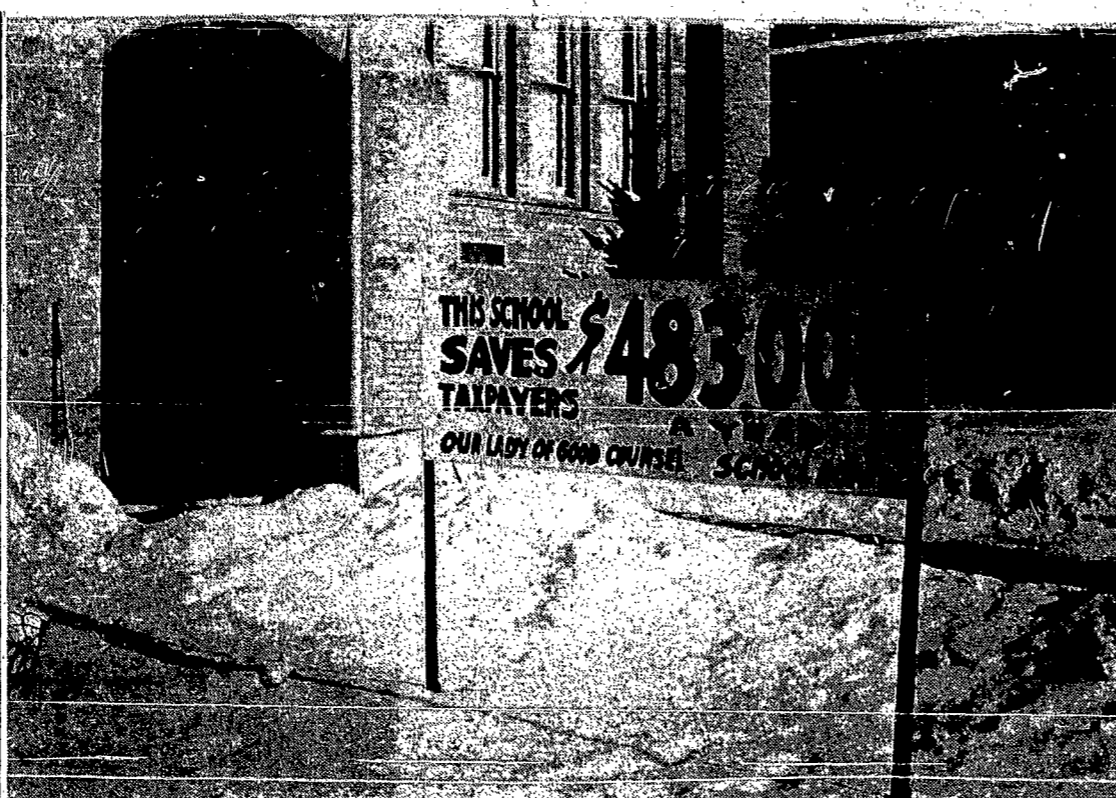

## Knights in Romp

Tom Combs and Ray O'Neill broke a tight game open in the second quarter and gave McQuaid an 82-52 victory over Marshall last weekend.

The Knights put their 6-5 record on the line tonight (Friday) against Aquinas and tackle a tough Edison team tomorrow night, both times at home.

Marshall pressed the Knights closely for the first eight minutes, trailing by only 19-15 at that point. But O'Neill hit for six baskets and Combs for four in the second period, and McQuaid had a 4-30 bulge at halftime. With Marshall scoring leader Rob Murphy fouling out

in the third quarter, the gap rose to 62-30, leaving the Knights reserves to play most of the final quarter.

O'Neill hit on 10 of 14 shots, including his last seven in a row, and wound up with 21 points, his best showing of the season. Combs also had a season high of 25, shooting 11 for 22. Overall, McQuaid hit on 38 of 85 attempts, for a 42 percent showing.

McQuaid's junior varsity squad also topped Marshall, raising its record to 7-4. The Knight freshmen, however, dropped a 2-point decision to Brighton for their fourth loss in 5 outings.

## Irish Post 6th Win

Aquinas Institute's basketball team led from the start last Friday afternoon and went on to hand a scrappy Jefferson High five an 83-60 drubbing on the Jefferson hardwood.

The Irish posted their sixth win of the current campaign against five losses while Jeff dropped their ninth in 12 outings.

Aquinas started off like a Saturn missile with a 60 percent shooting average from the field in the first canto and led 31-10 after the first period stop. At halftime it was 45-28.

Brady Spetz and John Dugan shared scoring honors with 20 points a piece. Junior Tom Hill had 12.

In the statistics department, Aquinas was 51 percent from

the floor and 59 percent from the charity stripe. Jefferson managed to connect on only 30 percent of its shots, collecting only two field goals in the first quarter and three in the last period.

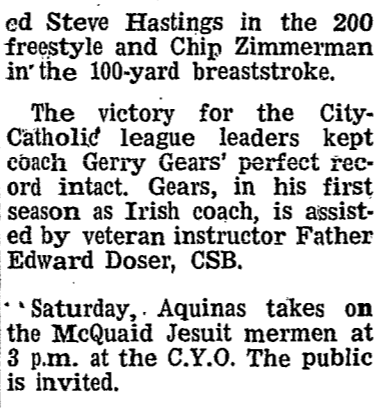

## Original Music Notes Fisher Anniversary

St. John Fisher College, celebrating the 15th anniversary of the granting of its absolute charter, has had the occasion recorded in music through an original score by Rochester composer William Ferris.

Commissioned to write an appropriate piece for this year's commemoration, Ferris has finished the work entitled "Durobriva—music for tenors, basses, five brasses and kettledrums."

St. John Fisher College was founded in 1948 as a private, independent, liberal arts college for men. The pioneer class of 110 entered in 1951 with one building on the campus. Since that time the plant has grown to 13 buildings with a multi-

million dollar library on the drawing boards.

The alumni association numbers some 3,000 members and the enrollment of the college is more than 1,800 students.

While the majority of students at one time were from the immediate Rochester area, the student body now is evenly divided between area students and out-of-state students — almost all of the 50 states and several foreign countries being represented.

Two of Ferris' works were performed by members of the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra at the celebrations concert at St. John Fisher in 1968, including his first symphony, "October—November." Ferris is organist-choirmaster at Sacred Heart Cathedral.
