

Fisher Qualifies For 'Bundy Aid'

Albany—Six weeks after the religious affiliation of St. John Fisher College was cited as reason for refusing "Bundy program aid" to the school, the State Education Department ruled that the college is entitled to assistance under the same program.

St. John Fisher College has re-organized its governing body and religious instructional requirements.

The college was among 33 other colleges with present or past church affiliation to seek the Bundy program aid, passed by the legislature in 1968 and financed in 1969.

Under the program, private four-year colleges and universities are eligible for state aid

to sustain private initiatives in providing educational opportunity for the students of New York State.

Education Commissioner Ewald B. Nyquist, in rejecting St. John's bid for aid on Jan. 5, noted that while he was compelled to find the school's request unconstitutional, he felt the college "is making a significant contribution to the total higher education effort in New York State."

In this most recent move, Nyquist said his determinations were made according to an analysis of the institution's purpose and goals, the composition of its governing body and the content of its religion courses as well as whether such courses were mandatory.
