Hoop Playoffs Begin Tomorrow

The 12th annual Diocesan High School Basketball tournament quarter finals open tomorrow night, March 7, with Bishop Kearney (4-9) traveling to Auburn to meet Mt. Carmel. The game will be played in the Auburn Community Gym at 8 p.m. Mt. Carmel with a 15-3 record will be the favorite.

McQuaid Jesuit (9-5) will face St. Anthony of Padua (2-10) at 1:30 p.m., Sunday, March 8, at Monroe Community College. Also at Monroe, Cardinal Mooney (13-1) will face DeSales (0-16) at 3:30 p.m. Between games, the gymnastics team from Padua, rated one of the best in the nation, will perform under the direction of Father Emil Rakowski.

In the South, Notre Dame (9-8) will face Aquinas (7-8) in the Corning Community College, March 8, at 2:30 p.m.

The semifinals will be played in a doubleheader at Monroe Community College, Saturday, March 14. Either Mooney or DeSales will play either Aquinas or Notre Dame at 7 p.m. Either McQuaid or St. Anthony of Padua will play either Kearney or Mt. Carmel at 9 p.m.

The winners of the semifinals will compete in the Championship Game at Monroe Community College, Sunday, March 15, at 2:30 p.m.

CYO Tourney To Be Played At 3 Sites

The CYO basketball tournament will be played simultaneously in three cities this weekend.

The annual diocesan playoff series has been dubbed the Bishops' Tournament, and the divisions will bear the names of Rochester's five contemporary bishops.

Thirty-two parochial school teams will compete in four championship divisions.

High school teams from eight parishes will vie for a single title. Elimination contests will be held in Rochester, Elmira and Auburn, Saturday, March 7 with finals on Sunday.

More than 3,600 boys have taken part in the program this season.

McQuaid Defeated

McQuaid lost the handle in the last quarter against Madison last Saturday and dropped their home finale of the season, 69-62, to the quick-moving city squad.

The Knights will carry a 9-9 record into the diocesan tournament this Sunday, seeking the first two victories that could give them a last shot at defending champion Cardinal Mooney.

McQuaid seemed well on the way to its tenth win of the year when it opened up a 29-21 lead at halftime and canned the first goal of the third period for a 10-point bulge. That, however, was reckoning without Madison's perpetual motion man, Larry Gilenwater, who flooded the nets with 25 points in the last 15 minutes of play. Gilenwater started the Wilson Parkers uphill with his fast-break-

ing and jump-shooting and finally put them ahead to stay, 50-49, with 2 foul shots. McQuaid had just regained the lead on a 3-point play by Ned Miller, but the Knights weren't able to answer back this time until the Parkers had run together 10 points for a 58-49 lead.

There were still 4 minutes remaining, but the inevitable parade to the foul line McQuaid sought "possession" kept the Knights from mounting a serious threat the rest of the way.

Four Knights were in double figures in the losing cause, led by Miller with 15, Mike Ryan had 13, Ray O'Neill 12, and John McLane 10 in their last hurrahs at home. For Madison, the turnover totalled 30, and Chester McGill backed him up with 14.

East Beats Irish

Aquinas Institute's basketball team staged a last quarter rally but it was not enough to overcome the commanding lead held by East High as the Orientals defeated the Irish, 84-78, last Saturday night at the old R.I.T. gymnasium.

Aquinas, led by junior Tom Rowling's seven first quarter points, jumped off to a 14-11 lead but the Orientals paced by senior center Willie Grimes, pumped in 29 points in the second quarter as East fronted at the half, 40-30.

In the fourth quarter, the Irish, led by Tom Hill and Larry Mitchell, closed the gap to five points with a little over two minutes remaining. East High's Willie Grimes led all scorers, popping in 38 points despite fouling out midway through the fourth quarter. Tom Hill led all Aquinas scorers with 21 points. John Dugan contributed 15 and Tom Rowling and Brady Spetz, 11 each.

Irish Swimmers Sail To Perfect Season

Already the fans were screaming. "We're number one!" and "Let's make it 17 straight!" came from the Aquinas rosters crowded in the cosy Newark High pool bleachers. A priest came in and a roar from the Aquinas partisans went up as he gave them the clenched fist.

This was a big meet. The last on the Irish schedule and the chance to claim a perfect season. Aquinas has previously captured the City-Catholic title and now was looking for one more victory to keep its sea-

son's record unblemished. And Newark was perhaps Aquinas' most formidable foe.
