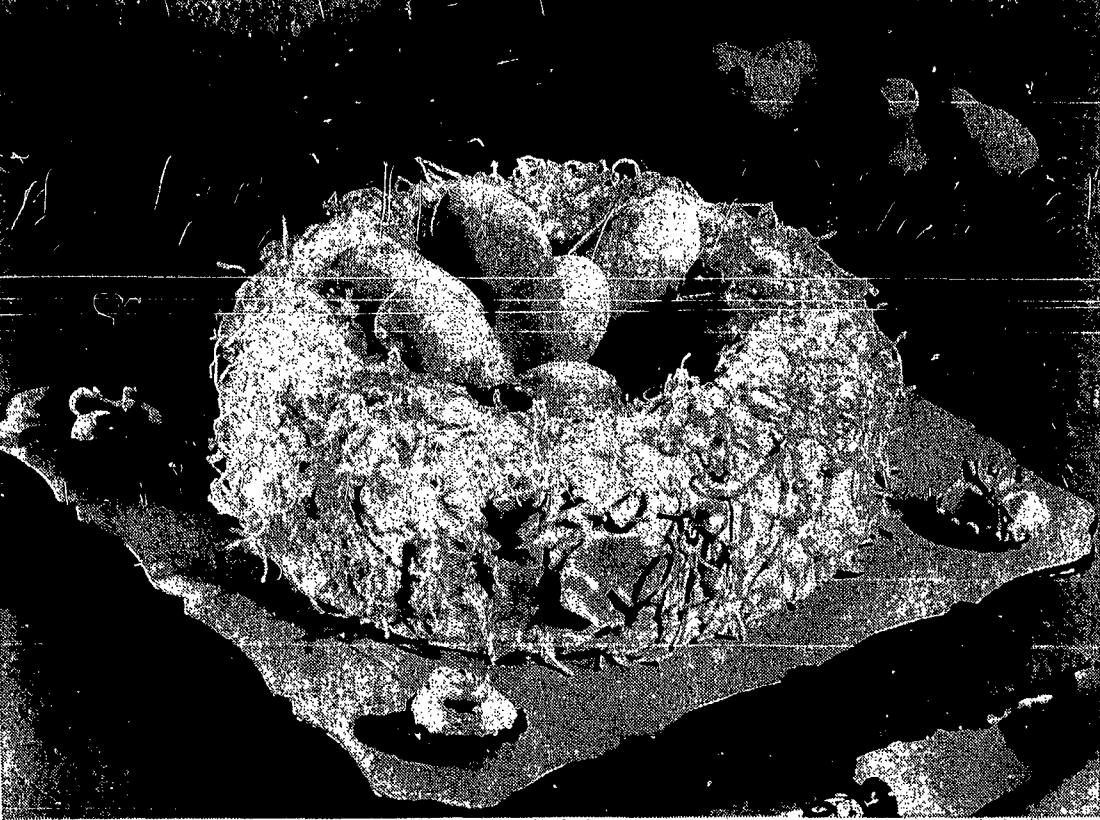

An Easter Nest Cake

A cake that looks like something else has special appeal for little children. This Easter nest begins with half a cake mix baked in a one-quart ring mold. It is covered with apricot frosting and coconut, and the eggs it holds are made of uncooked fondant.

The frosting recipe:

1 egg white
 1/4 cup light corn syrup
 1/4 cup apricot jam
 Few drops almond extract

Beat egg white until stiff but not dry. Combine corn syrup and apricot jam; gradually beat into egg white. Continue beating until frosting stands in firm peaks. Fold in almond extract.

Double the recipe when making a standard two-layer cake.

Uncooked fondant:

1/4 cup margarine
 1/4 cup light corn syrup
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix margarine, corn syrup, salt and vanilla in large mixing bowl. Add sugar all at once. Mix all together — first with a spoon, then knead in dry ingredients with hands. Turn onto board and continue kneading until mixture is well blended and smooth. Makes about 1 1/2 pounds candy. Divide and tint with various vegetable colors. Shape into eggs. Store in cool place.

Courier Survey

The Saturday Mass ...How It's Going

Rescheduling the Sunday Mass obligation on Saturday is causing the problems Bishop Hagan hoped it wouldn't.

In an informal survey of 17 parishes this week, the Courier-Journal discovered decreased attendance in the churches that did not schedule a Saturday Mass. However, churches that did reschedule reported only a minimum of growth in weekend attendance and income.

The reason offered for the discrepancy was that the new scheduling was still in its fledgling state: it was too early to determine long range effects.

While the pastors asked told the Courier that the majority of lay comments on the new scheduling was favorable, the reaction of some of the clergy was less than enthusiastic, and one pastor was reported to be forthrightly condemnatory. The latter was said to have told at congregations that attendance at the new Saturday Mass did not satisfy the Sunday obligation. "Pop and bishops to the contrary," his colleague chuckled.

One pastor described himself as the "man in the middle" over the Saturday Mass. He has not rescheduled the Sunday obligation, but he is inclined to, by declines in income and attendance.

To ease the possibility of rivalry in Mass attendance, all the pastors of Rochester suburb recently decided to inaugurate the new scheduling together. Polls were taken in the individual parishes, however, and, by the preference of the laity, the times of the Masses will vary from parish to parish.

Several pastors reported feeling that one church in a given area or community was sufficient for the Saturday Mass. This reason was given only by pastors who either do not expect to or will not schedule a Saturday Mass.

Many pastors reported they will inaugurate the new scheduling in the near future. All of these expect to begin about Easter or shortly thereafter.

One of the stipulations Bishop Hagan placed on granting permission for the Saturday Mass was that pastors realign their Sunday schedule, dropping one Mass.

Excerpts from the Holy discourse at the weekly luncheon of November 10, 1969, published in *L'Osservatore Romano*.

We wish to draw your attention to an event about to occur in the Catholic Church: the introduction of the new rite of Mass. The Mass will be celebrated in a rather different manner in which we have been used to celebrate it in the centuries, from the reign of V. after the Council of Trent to the present.

This change has something about it, something extraordinary. This is because the Mass is the traditional and able expression of our religious life and the authenticity of what we ask ourselves, how can a change be made? What can it have on those who attend Mass?

Answers will be given to the questions and to others like them from this innovation. You will find the answers in all the churches will be amply repeated there, all religious publications, schools where Christian doctrine is taught. We exhort you to participate in them. In that way you will be able to get a clearer and deeper view of the stupendous and mysterious of the Mass.
