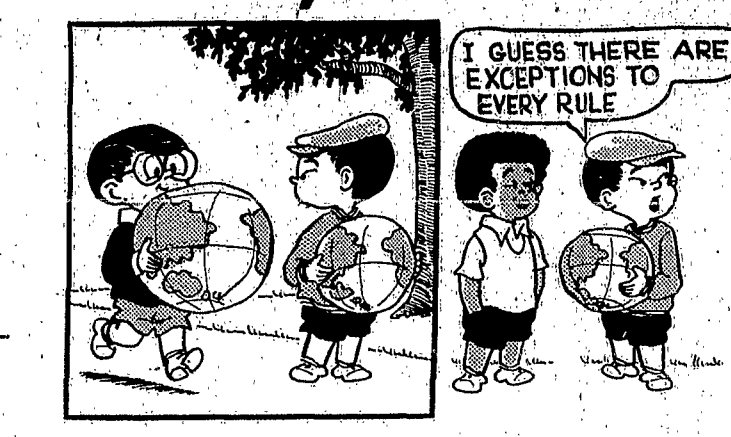
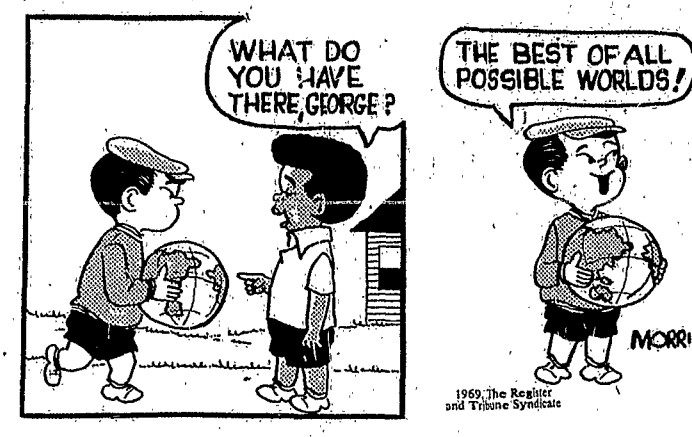

 His reply was that he would give me \$100.00 for a present and the last support check to my cousin because I could be living at home with him.
 It is just that my brother and I cannot stand that thing

that dad married. He married her when I was 11 and at that time we liked her. Then dad sold our old house and got rid of our old furniture because "mother" wanted things to her taste. He even made us put our mother's pictures and keepsakes out of sight.
 A couple weeks later I just could not stand the sight of that woman any more and I told her off but good right in front of dad and then I told him off too. My brother put his ideas forth also.
 Dad grew very angry and said that he would give us a choice: either he "decent respectful children" or get out of the house if our cousin would take us for boarders.
 Since my father does not and never will understand me, don't you think I am entitled to a college education which he should pay for? Can I make him support me through college? I sincerely believe he owes me plenty.

 Just judging from your letter, I think you are being unfair to your father. You don't seem to be much interested in his welfare or happiness.
 Before you do anything else, I suggest you examine the situation more closely. Was your home life that bad, or are you being selfish and perhaps jealous of your step-mother?
 As for the legal aspects, regarding the financial support your father may be liable for. I suggest you consult a lawyer. The laws are different in each state.
 However, since your father is willing to have you live with him and since a judge has already ruled against you, I would suspect the legal ruling probably would be against you.
 I personally think that both you and your brother could use your father's guidance—this is especially true for your brother who is only 16. I hope you have enough humility and concern for your brother at least to consider the possibility that you might be wrong and your father right. Pray hard for guidance in this most important matter.

Buffalo Catholic Schools Borrowing in Millions

(Special to the Courier-Journal)
Albany — The financial crisis is real enough for Catholic schools in Buffalo—with only 12 per cent of the enrollment in the state's parochial schools — to borrow money at the rate of \$1 million for each four months of the school year, the Republican State Platform Committee has been told.
 "It may be that no help will come," Kevin Kennedy, attorney for the Buffalo Catholic Diocese, said in testimony before the committee, "and these students will turn, by necessity to the public schools. It's a matter of arithmetic how much this would cost the state."
 By contrast, he said, the Speno-Lerner legislation "would not dislocate the economy, but would head off chaos that would occur if the Catholic school system were closed."
 The Republican committee was urged to give GOP support to the Speno-Lerner bill, which would provide state financial assistance to parents paying private school tuition.
 A leading Buffalo labor leader joined Kennedy in urging support for the Speno-Lerner measure.
 George L. Wessel, president of the Buffalo AFL-CIO Council, reaffirmed labor's support of efforts to repeal the Blaine Amendment and also urged passage of the Speno-Lerner bill.
 Kennedy, in outlining the financial plight which he said threatens the very existence of Catholic schools, said 80,000 children are now attending Catholic schools in the Buffalo diocese—12 per cent of the student population in Catholic schools in the state.
 Some 800,000 children attend Catholic elementary and secondary schools in the State.
