Pa. Ups Nonpublic Aid

Harrisburg, Pa. — (NC) — Pennsylvania lawmakers have paved the way to tap a more lucrative source of revenue for its trail-blazing aid to nonpublic education law.

Both the Senate and the House by lopsided majority votes have agreed to a bigger and better aid program. Only the formality of ironing out differences in bills passed by the House remains, and the measure will be sped to the desk of Gov. Raymond P. Shafer.

Aid Wins in Maryland

Annapolis, Md. — (NC) — Maryland legislators bucked against the wishes of Gov. Marvin Mandel and Catholic legislators to give state aid to nonpublic education.

The governor has said he favors the form of nonpublic school aid but prefers to wait until next year when a special commission will report on a study of the entire field of private school aid. The governor also has said he would prefer to wait until the issue has been settled by the U.S. Supreme Court.

The House of Delegates Ways and Means Committee by a vote of 17-14 approved a bill to provide nonpublic school aid by purchasing services rendered in such schools by teachers of nonreligious subjects.

Harrisburg, Pa. — (NC) — Two Catholic nuns who taught an adult Sunday school class at Christ Presbyterian church during Lent "made us aware of how alike we are," a class member said. "Not one of us felt that they were Catholic and we were Presbyterian."

Catholic 'Wit' Not Forgotten

London — (NC) — Like most actors, Richard Huggett often finds himself with time to spare — during rehearsals or between parts.

Unlike some actors, he doesn't pass the time in the local pub. He needs every moment he can get to finish a book he's writing called "The Wit of the Catholics."

Huggett, a benign, white-haired figure with twinkling eyes, lives in a tiny cluttered room in the heart of Soho, London's Greenwich Village. He wears a green pajama-like boiler suit, a bow tie, bedroom slippers and travels around London on a bicycle with blue mudguards.

When he got the idea for his book he looked up a publisher who liked the idea and then advertised in several newspapers, inviting readers to send him their favorite Catholic jokes. The response was tremendous.

"I think a lot of people were glad to get them off their chests," he commented. "They were only too pleased to hear of someone who was interested in hearing them."

The jokes came rolling in by the mail bag full. He files them under headings such as "The Confessional," "Doctrine and Dogmas," "The Pearly Gates," "The Anglican Heritage," etc. He thinks the book will run to 20,000 words when finished.

Huggett, who is half-Irish, rejects any suggestion that the book is anti-Catholic. Most of the jokes, he pointed out, come to him from Catholics, and he is a Catholic himself.

It's hard, Huggett said, to find jokes that haven't been done to death.

One of his own favorites concerns an old farmer in a small Irish village. The farmer is on his death-bed. He announces that his last wish is to become a Protestant.

Alarmed relatives send for the parish priest.

"What's all this nonsense about becoming a Protestant, Michael?" the priest asks.

"Ah sure, Father," the old man answers, "I was thinking that if I have to go wouldn't it be better now for one of them to go than one of us?"

Huggett hasn't found anyone to write the foreword yet, but he's thinking of asking the Pope.

High Walls, High Fashion

Paris — Would you believe it — cloistered nuns making beauty creams? Or, even, working for leading Paris fashion houses?

Well, it's true. Eighty per cent of the 500 cloistered convents in France earn their income from just such work done by their members within the cloister walls.

And a permanent exhibition has opened in Paris to show the wide range of goods produced by the nuns during their daily five or six working hours.

Against a background of soft music, a visitor to the exhibition can taste a bit of "pate de cerise" truffles, prepared by Carmelites in Nogent-sur-Marne, or nibble on the chocolate im-

tation champagne corks made by Cistercian nuns in Igny. There are also samples of nut-made cookies, honey and candy.

In addition to the culinary delights, there are exhibits of key rings, tea sets, baby clothes, and even prison uniforms — all produced by the Sisters.

Nuns of the Order of Saint Clare, in Laver, make teddy bears. Benedictine nuns at Chantelle make beauty creams and grapefruit remover—used in the Polias Bergeres — and even after-shave lotions.

And — the piece de resistance — many French nuns are paid union wages by such prestigious Paris fashion houses as Chanel, Yves Saint Laurent, Hermes, Courmages, Cardin, help in the making of mini-, midi, and maxi-dresses.

Jesuits Split

Rome — The question of free to express a personal opinion split the Jesuit community at the year-old Pontifical Gregorian university.

Jesuit faculty members told they must get permission from the university president before giving any press interviews. Their religious superior, Father Herber, who is also the president, is the editor after three professors had objected, in print, to what was considered Vatican "meddling" in Italian divorce issue.

The "Gregorian Three" — Father Emilio Pin, Jose Diez-Alegria, Paolo Tufari — took on the Vatican in the 1929 Lateran Pact and the initial Italian Jesuit fortnightly Civiltà Cattolica (Catholic Civilization) in an interview which the newspaper Il Messaggero carried March 8.

The three professors said they felt the Church's duty was to help correct consciences about divorce to exert pressures on Italian life to defeat the divorce bill.
