3 Fisher Athletes Cited Nationally

Three St. John Fisher College athletes will be honored in the 1970 volume of Outstanding College Athletes of America. Nominated by the college earlier this year, the three were chosen to appear in this awards publication on the basis of their achievements.

Selected for the honor are Robert S. Cupello of Irondequoit, soccer; Terrence D. Farrington of Victor, golf; and Richard M. Hessinger of Kenmore, basketball.

Outstanding College Athletes of America is sponsored by the Outstanding Americans Foundation, a nonprofit organization dedicated to honoring Americans of achievement.

Criteria for selection include the athlete's sports achievements, leadership ability, athletic recognition and community service.

Cupello, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Cupello of 43 Air-

ington Ave. is a senior majoring in French. He plans to attend graduate school and will try out for professional soccer or football.

He holds the four-year soccer scoring record for the college, 90; the single season scoring record, 31; the most goals in a game, 7; most goals in a quarter, 4; and most goals in a half, 6.

Cupello was chosen to the All-State Soccer Team the past two years.

Farrington, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Farrington of 1416 Victor-Holcomb Road, is a junior majoring in general business.

A graduate of Victor High School, he transferred to St. John Fisher from Monroe Community College. Farrington is a medalist player on the varsity golf team.

Hessinger, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard A. Hessinger of

He has been a guard on the varsity basketball team for the past three years. He was co-captain of the team this year.
