Fr. Berrigan Re-Appears in Ithaca

The Courier-Journal asked John Dash, staff-writer, to give his impressions of the past weekend at Cornell, billed as "America Is Hard to Find", and designed as a tribute to former Cornell United Religious Work chaplain, Father Daniel Berrigan, S.J., now resisting imprisonment after his conviction for burning draft files.

Ithaca — As Dan Berrigan sauntered to the microphone 10,000 people stood and applauded. Someone remarked "Why, he's getting as good a reception as Richard Nixon at the Republican convention."

It was Berrigan's first public appearance since he went underground, defying the federal authorities' mandate for his arrest. He told the audience of Cornell students, faculty, friends and FBI agents, "It's up to you whether I'll surrender or not." Clenched fists surged upward all over the au-

ditorium and the crowd roared, "Never, never."

Except for the passion Berrigan's quicksilver appearances brought out, the weekend tribute to him was loose-jointed, a mash of fantasy, radical seriousness, liberal talk and an ill-defined romanticism that flourishes in the movement. You could hear somebody in the crowd saying over and over, "Liberate me so I can explore my inner ecstasies."

It was the family reunion for the movement. A gathering of the clan to talk about the trouble Daniel was in, to talk about the trouble many others were in, and to get the business of the future under way.

And it looked like most of the family was there: David Dellinger, Harvey Cox, William Kunstler, Michael Cullen, Arthur Waskow, and cousins from SANE to Weathermen.

As the weekend drew to a

close, one certainty sprang from the jumble. There is in this country a priest who broke the law to build a world of peace who is now being sought by the federal government. He will stay in that state as long as he can.


