Terence Cardinal Cooke of New York and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller will share the spotlight at the 75th Convention of the state Knights of Columbus May 7-9 at Hotel Concord, Lake Kiamesha.

Bishop Walter P. Kellenberg of Rockville Centre, state chaplain, will be the principal celebrant of a Mass preceding Friday morning's convention session.

At the Diamond Jubilee banquet Friday evening Lt. Gov. Malcolm Wilson will be toastmaster and Cardinal Cooke and Gov. Rockefeller will speak.

Teens Organize 25-Mile Hike For 'Hope'

A "Hike for Hope" will begin and end at Cobbs Hill Park Sunday, May 3, and an undetermined number of young people will find out how far they can walk for money. They don't get the money, though.

The minimum fee is 10 cents a mile. Each hiker must have a sponsor who agrees to pay. The principal beneficiary will be Project Hope, but 15 per cent of the proceeds will go to other charities selected by the walkers. They will register at the park between 8 and 9 a.m.

The program is under the auspices of Teen League, which has members in all 40 of the high schools in Monroe County. The walkers' mileage will be certified at various checkpoints along the 25-mile route that winds through the city and back to Cobbs Hill.

Project Hope's share of the revenue will go into its medical education work among the Mexican-Americans and Navajo Indians, and in foreign countries.

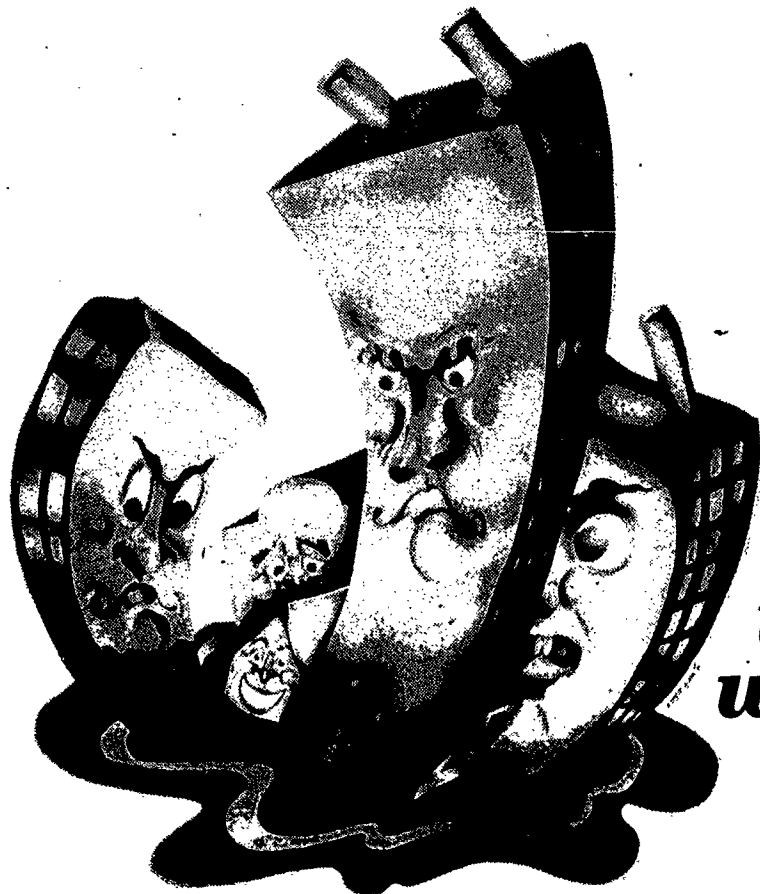
Shut-ins Need More Friends
