2 Offer Vows As SVD Brothers

Brother Matthew Zemel, SVD, a Rochesterian, and Brother Ronald Berger, an art student here, offered their final vows last weekend as missionary Brothers in the Society of the Divine Word.

Brother Matthew's profession ceremony took place Saturday at the order's seminary chapel at Conesus, where he began his training in 1961. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew C. Zemel of Angelus Drive and is a graduate of Our Lady of Perpetual Help school. He is stationed at the Duxbury, Mass., seminary.

Brother Ronald, who is studying for a master's degree in art at Rochester Institute of Technology, professed his vows Sunday in his home parish in Aurora, Ill. He was awarded a bachelor's degree last May by the Minneapolis College of Art and Design, and was the only student graduated summa cum laude. He expects to teach art in a Divine Word college.

duction. Second place was awarded to John Liccone for work in the field of evolution and social organization effects. Karl and Christina Scheuerman won third place for chicken embryology.

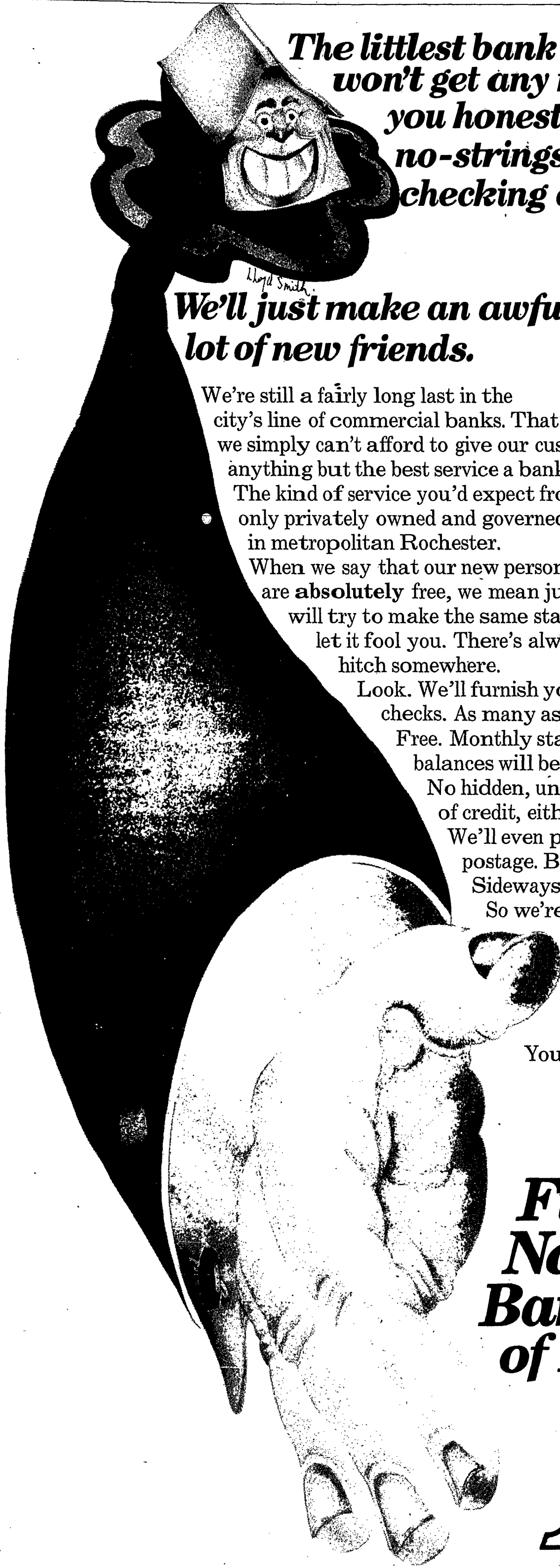
Honorable mention awards were presented to Brian Fink
