**Genesee Sets  
Pre-Surgery  
Classes**

Genesee Hospital patients awaiting surgery now have a chance to learn what to expect. Each evening from Sunday through Thursday Mrs. Susanne B. Stonewell, R.N., conducts small classes to which patients scheduled for surgery the next day, and their families, are invited. A short presentation on what to expect before and after surgery is followed by discussion centered on the patients' questions. At the request of the patients, classes are conducted individually for men and women.

The evening after surgery, Mrs. Stonewell meets with the patients on an individual basis to answer any further questions and to assist them with their pulmonary treatment. During the first week, a total of 82 patients and 41 immediate members of the patients' families were educated about what to expect at the time of surgery.

Mrs. Stonewell is a member of the 1969 graduating class from the Genesee Hospital School of Nursing.

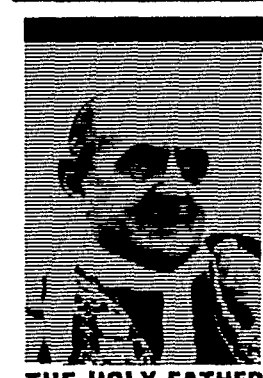
