

300 Delegates Attend State CDA Meeting

More than 300 delegates from throughout the state were slated to be in session at the 32nd biennial convention of the New York State Court, Catholic Daughters of America, on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, May 20-22, at Rochester's Flagship Hotel.

Election of officers will feature a business meeting at 9 a.m. Thursday. The day's program includes a 2:30 p.m. business session; Mass for delegates at 5 p.m., installation of officers at 8 p.m. and a 9:30 p.m. reception.

At 8:45 p.m. Friday there will be a tour of Kodak Park and a luncheon.

Cochairmen of convention arrangements are Mrs. Frank J. Donahue of Court Nativity 931, Brockport, a state court vice regent, and Mrs. William E. Crosby, district deputy and grand regent of Court Our Lady of the Cenacle 1189, Rochester.

Among convention features is an exhibit room displaying work done by women throughout the state. It will be staffed by Mrs. James Chaippone and Mrs. James LaDelfa of Rochester.

Included will be a display of vestments made by Mrs. LaDelfa, Mrs. James Lipomi, Mrs. Anthony Montemaro and Mrs. Genevieve Insalaco, which will be donated to a mission priest.

Exceptional Children Receive Communion

Ten exceptional children received their first Holy Communion Saturday morning, May 9, in St. Charles Borromeo Church, Greece, under the sponsorship of the diocesan Confraternity of Christian Doctrine.

It was the second such ceremony within a month. Four other children in the CCD program received first Communion April 18 in St. Ambrose Church.

Similar programs are under way in four other CCD centers in the diocese — St. Boniface, Rochester; Guardian Angels, Henrietta; Capuchin Priory, Geneva, and St. Margaret Mary, Apalachin.

Father William F. McCall, assistant at St. Boniface, is director of the special education project and has noted that it can accommodate many more children than are now enrolled.

Father John Quinn, assistant at St. Charles, directs the program there. Mrs. George Mallory is advisor, and several volunteers are among the teachers. Heading the program for the mentally handicapped is Mrs. Gerald Sullivan, and the class

for children with learning disabilities is in charge of Mrs. Constance Nichol.

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
