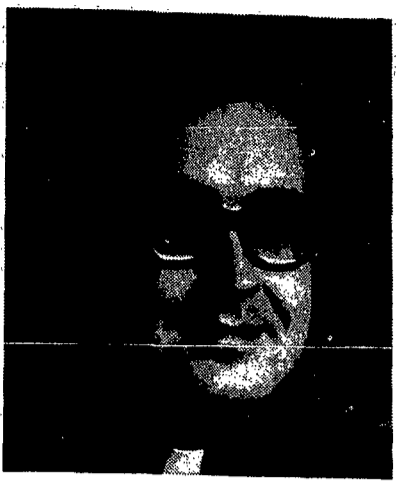
Elmira — A requiem Mass was offered May 2 in St. Casimir's Church for John S. Kamas of North Main Street, father of two St. Joseph nuns.
