Art Gallery Exhibition Honors Carl Hersey

An exhibition honoring Carl K. Hersey, from 1936 to 1968 chairman of the department of fine arts of the University of Rochester, is current at the Memorial Art Gallery Sunday.

Professor Hersey retires from teaching this year after 34 years on the University of Rochester faculty.

The exhibition, "Homage to Carl K. Hersey," is a collection of art objects and photographs that illustrate his contributions in a number of areas: his work for the preservation of local architectural landmarks, his teaching and research in art and architectural history, and his collections of early lighting equipment, Yankee utensils, American historical flasks, and Spanish iron and copper work. his work with the Gallery, which he served as a member of the Board of Managers and its art committee during his years as fine arts department chairman.

Hersey is a former president of the Landmark Society, the Rochester Historical Society and the Central New York Society of Architectural Historians. He has been a consultant to the New York State Council on the Arts since 1963.
