Catholic Press Reminded Of Public's Right to Know

Chicago — (RNS)— The U.S. Catholic bishops' top administrator challenged the Catholic press here to "recommit" itself to the Church-endorsed principles of "the right to information" and "the necessity of public opinion within the Church."

At the same time he credited the Catholic press with much of the development within the Church since Vatican II, stating that it has been instrumental in "reflecting the real image of the Church . . . not static but dynamic . . . not simply of a vast institution, but also of a people of God . . . called to holiness."

Bishop Joseph L. Bernardin, delivering the address at the banquet of the Catholic Press Association's 60th annual convention here (May 22), spoke on the convention theme—"The Church and the Press . . . Five Years After the Council."

The prelate, a former auxiliary bishop in Atlanta, Ga., now is general secretary of both the National Conference of Catholic Bishops (NCCB) and the U.S. Catholic Conference (USCC).

Bishop Bernardin, stressing that more must be done than simply to acknowledge the correlation between the Church's growth and an effective Catholic press, said, however, that the right to information places important demands upon professional communicators.

"To be sure," he said, "the circumstances . . . demand a great deal of prudence, taking into consideration those twin pillars of the moral order, justice and charity."

Bishop Bernardin then pointed to five areas of progress in the Church over the last five years — liturgy, awareness of rights, shared responsibility, ecumenism and social and economic development.

Speaking of new approaches to "rights and remedies" with the Church, especially due process for priests, religious and laity, Bishop Bernardin said the Catholic bishops are now prepared to establish mediation and arbitration boards for those who wish to avail themselves of the service.

He said the bishops have en-

dorsed a set of due process principles which can be used on the diocesan or regional levels. They are aimed at the quickest possible resolution of conflicts which could lead to "polarization and bitterness."

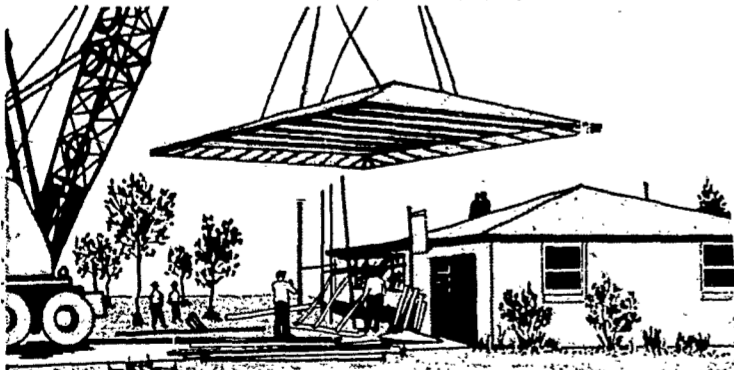
