Nazareth Schedules **Summer Innovations**

Two new workshops, a visiting lecturer and a wide variety of courses will highlight the 1970 Nazareth College Summer Session June 24-Aug. 4.

A unique electronic music workshop will be offered June 29-July 10 for student musicians, teachers and others.

Harry Hollander, a Massa-chusetts Institute of Technology chemist and industrial consultant, will conduct a workshop in plastics from July 20-31. Students will explore the application of plastic resins and allied materials as an art medium.

Nazareth will again offer a pre-college art workshop for high school students who have completed their junior or senior year. It will be held June 28-July 11.

Dr. George J. Spears, visiting professor of English, will teach the short story course, as well as serve as consultant for continuing education. Dr. Spears is chairman of the di-vision of humanities at Manattee College, Sarasota, Fla.

This years' summer session will include nearly 50 offerings in liberal arts and the sciences designed to lead to degree programs, teacher certification or self-enrichment.

A summer session "first" will be a Speech and Hearing Clinic for adults and children. Services will include speech and language evaluations, and diagnostic testing and therepy for the speech and hearing handicapped.

Another innovation this year will be an inexpensive child care center on campus.

As in the past, a series of lectures, films, informal concerts and art exhibitions will be presented for the benefit of all summer students.

A professor of psychology at Loyola University, Chicago, for 30 years, Father Herr was chairman of the department from 1945 to 1968 when he retired to conduct research.

College Students Suicide-Prone

Milwaukee — (RNS) — Adolescents and the aging are most prone to depression, but college-age people are more suicide-prone than any other segment of the population, a consulting psychiatrist at Marquette University said here.

Dr. Don H. Martin, who works with students at the university counseling service, described depression as an emotional condition characterized by sadness and loss of interest which can be mild or so severe if can result in suicide.

A college student plagued by depression, he said, is generally physically and emotionally unhappy and "feels a kind of pervasive anxiety unrelated to any specific cause he can identify."

"Usually he is unhappy with himself, his relations with others and his environment," Dr. Martin said.

. Noting that there are more

depressed adolescents than is apparent, he observed that they "often resort to drugs or alcohol in an effort to improve the situation." He said this delays psychiatric assistance at best, or causes a crisis at worst.

The doctor pointed out that drugs or alcohol are not causes of depression, although they may aggravate the depressive emotional condition already present.
