

New Jobs Listed For Mercy Nuns

Sister Mary dePazzi was named coordinator of the Mercy Sisters' Retirement Program, Sister Patricia Donovan assigned to the University of Virginia to study Law, and Sister Ruth Ostertag appointed school consultant to the DePaul Clinic in the Sisters of Mercy annual apostolic appoints announced this week for the year beginning September 1970.

Formerly director of the McAuley Reading Laboratory, and currently a member of the congregation's 5-member council, Sister Mary dePazzi will continue developing the geriatrics program for the semiretired Sisters, originated last year by Sister Theresa Margaret, who will continue as her part-time assistant.

Sister Patricia Donovan, who resigned the principalship of Notre Dame High School in Elmira last year to undertake an intensive one-year study of the diocesan school system, will fulfill a long-awaited dream in September to begin to study for a degree in law.

Sister Ruth Ostertag will act as a liaison between the Catholic schools and the DePaul Clinic which serves the emotionally disturbed children of the diocese as part of Catholic Family Center services. Prior to her six years as principal of Good Shepherd School in Henrietta, Sister Ruth had several years experience in many different Sisters of Mercy elementary schools.

Of the approximately 400 appointments made public last week, nearly 250 were to the Catholic elementary and high schools which the Sisters of Mercy fully or partly staff.

Three parochial schools will have new Mercy principals: Good Shepherd will be headed by Sister Carolyn Knipper; Holy Cross School by Sister Elizabeth Ann Lenhard; and St. Louis in Pittsford by Sister Barbara Hamm.

Twelve Sisters now serve with various educational or social service agencies in the area. Assuming new duties for the Fall will be Sister Ellen Marie Delaney as a fulltime nurse for the Red Cross Blood Unit; Sister Maureen O'Byrne as a specialized remedial teacher at School 9; Sister Marilyn Waddell as a social aide at the Lewis Street Center.

Experimental work in Rochester's innercity will be introduced at the Mercy Sisters' Joseph Avenue Center with a specialized learning program for a small number of area children under the supervision of Sister Barbara DeFiore and at Mt. Carmel parish where Sister Marilyn Williams will be a reading consultant under a Title I Project.

Sister Jacqueline DeMars will be relieved of part of her teaching load at Mercy High School to become the congregation's bursar general; Sister Marietta Hanss, president of the Mercy Senate will replace Sister Mary dePazzi as the coordinator of formation for the community; Sister Marie Raymond, currently coordinator of the Motherhouse will work on a diocesan team to set up a counseling service for priests and sisters.

Thirty-seven members of the congregation will study at various colleges and universities both locally and across the country. In addition to the arts and law, some new fields of study include social welfare, X-ray and medical technology and occupational therapy.

Sisters, Mary Catherine Collins and Mary Agnes Georger will stay in Clyde to do parish work, when St. John's parochial school closes this month.
