



Pastoral Letter On Abortion

The following Pastoral Letter from Bishop Hogan on the new abortion law for N.Y. State will be formally read in all parishes of the diocese at Masses on July 11-12.

My dear People:

We honor God, the Author of all life, when we reverence human life. When human life is threatened and the plans of God are contradicted by man or by law, the Church must speak out for the protection and preservation of life.

In the face of legalized abortion the Catholics of the State of New York are faced with several grave challenges:

They must, first of all, understand and appreciate the Church's position on an infant's right to life and the necessity of protecting it.

They must, secondly, be aware of their responsibility to disapprove a law which is gravely wrong and an attitude which condones the deliberate death of the innocent

unborn. Intemperate namecalling and explosive indignation, however, will not help us reverse this deadly trend.

Thirdly, we must dedicate ourselves to solve the problems that bring women to ask for an abortion.

Finally, we must convince ourselves and especially our young people, that the virtues of purity in companykeeping, fidelity in marriage vows and generosity in accepting the Creator's plan for each family, must be believed and lived.

It is a basic principle of the Church that human conception always involves the direct, creative presence of Al-

might God. No matter how the pregnancy began, the unborn child possesses its right to life from God Himself, — not from the mother or father or society.

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Diocesan Sisters Form Council

Seventeen congregations of women serving in the Rochester Diocese will be represented on a newly-formed Diocesan Sisters' Council to convene for the first time next September.

Paralleling a similar organization for diocesan priests, the 26-member Council will consist of Sisters elected by their respective Congregations, the number of delegates proportionate to the total number of any one group working in the Diocese.

Fourteen sisters from the Sisters of Mercy and the Sisters of St. Joseph, whose Motherhouses

are in the Diocese, and who claim 1,262 of the 1,477 Sisters in the area, formed a steering committee to set up the framework to bring the Council into being.

Bishop Hogan, who will open the initial meeting on Sept. 26, has given full approval to the formation of the Council. He pointed out that such a move was in direct fulfillment of Vatican II's Decree on Religious Life which calls for constant and perpetual renewal.
