

U of D Vice President is Black

Detroit — (NC) — Dr. James W. Woodruff has been named vice president for academic services at the Jesuit conducted University of Detroit, the first black to hold that position.

Dr. Woodruff formerly served as head of the university's special projects office and has been a formulator of the university's new urban commitment program. He personally designed educational opportunity programs for minority groups and disadvantaged students at the university.

Canterbury to Visit Uganda

London — (RNS) — Anglican Archbishop Michael Ramsey of Canterbury is to follow in the footsteps of Pope Paul by visiting the East African territory of Uganda in December, according to an official Church announcement.

Pope Paul visited Uganda last summer. He consecrated a doz-

en African bishops, addressed the pan-African Bishops' Conference and visited the shrine of the Anglican martyrs.

Archbishop Ramsey is to visit the same country immediately after his visit to the Province of the Church of South Africa, the first ever paid to the Province by an Archbishop of Canterbury.

Fordham To Drop Lutheran

New York — (NC) — A Lutheran scholar who three years ago became the first non-Catholic in the theology department at Fordham University, will not be retained after the coming academic year.

The contract of the Rev. Robert L. Wilken, 33, will not be renewed because the department already has enough tenured teachers in Dr. Wilken's field, early church history, a university official said.

Several faculty members, in-

cluding Dr. Wilken, said the university action indicated a retreat from a previously expressed ideal of ecumenical cooperation in the field of theology.

Fordham officials said, however, that they would continue to recognize the university's ecumenical endeavor and were satisfied with Dr. Wilken's academic abilities, but that they needed a Protestant scholar to teach contemporary Protestant theology.

Layman Heads Nuns' College

San Juan, P.R. — (NC) — Dr. Rafael Garcia Bottari has been installed as the first layman president of the College of the Sacred Heart here. He is former director of the Regional

University of Puerto Rico College in Cayey.

The women's college, founded in 1936 by the Sisters of the Sacred Heart here, will start night courses for men in September.

CCD Has National Coordinator

Washington — (NC) — Father William J. Tobin, 34, has been named assistant director of the division for religious education — Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, U.S. Catholic Conference. He will help develop and coordinate programs for diocesan religious education offices nationally.

Father Tobin has been serv-

ing as assistant director of the New York archdiocesan Office of Christian and Family Development. He is a native of New York and an alumnus of the North American College in Rome, where he was ordained to the priesthood in 1960. He earned a doctorate in canon law from the Pontifical Gregorian University, Rome, in 1964.

Brooklyn Survey: Keep Our Schools

Brooklyn — (NC) — A lopsided 81 per cent majority, responding to a Brooklyn diocese "opinionnaire," favored continued operation of the diocesan grade and high school system despite rising costs.

Msgr. Eugene J. Molloy, diocesan secretary of education, said he was disappointed that only 65,980 responded to the poll in which 580,000 forms were distributed. There are 206,000 students in the diocese's 241 schools system.

The majority said tuition alone should not be the major basis for support of the school system. More than half favored parish and diocesan subsidies; 55 per cent held the diocese should collect special funds for

education, particularly from more affluent parishes. The 81 per cent voted against a suggestion of closing the schools, replacing them with Saturday or Sunday "education" centers for religious instructions.

Average tuition in a parish elementary school is \$105 a year, compared with \$20 in 1966. Average high school tuition is \$600 a year (double the rate a year ago), which compares with \$185 in 1966.

Big Farms Sign With Chavez

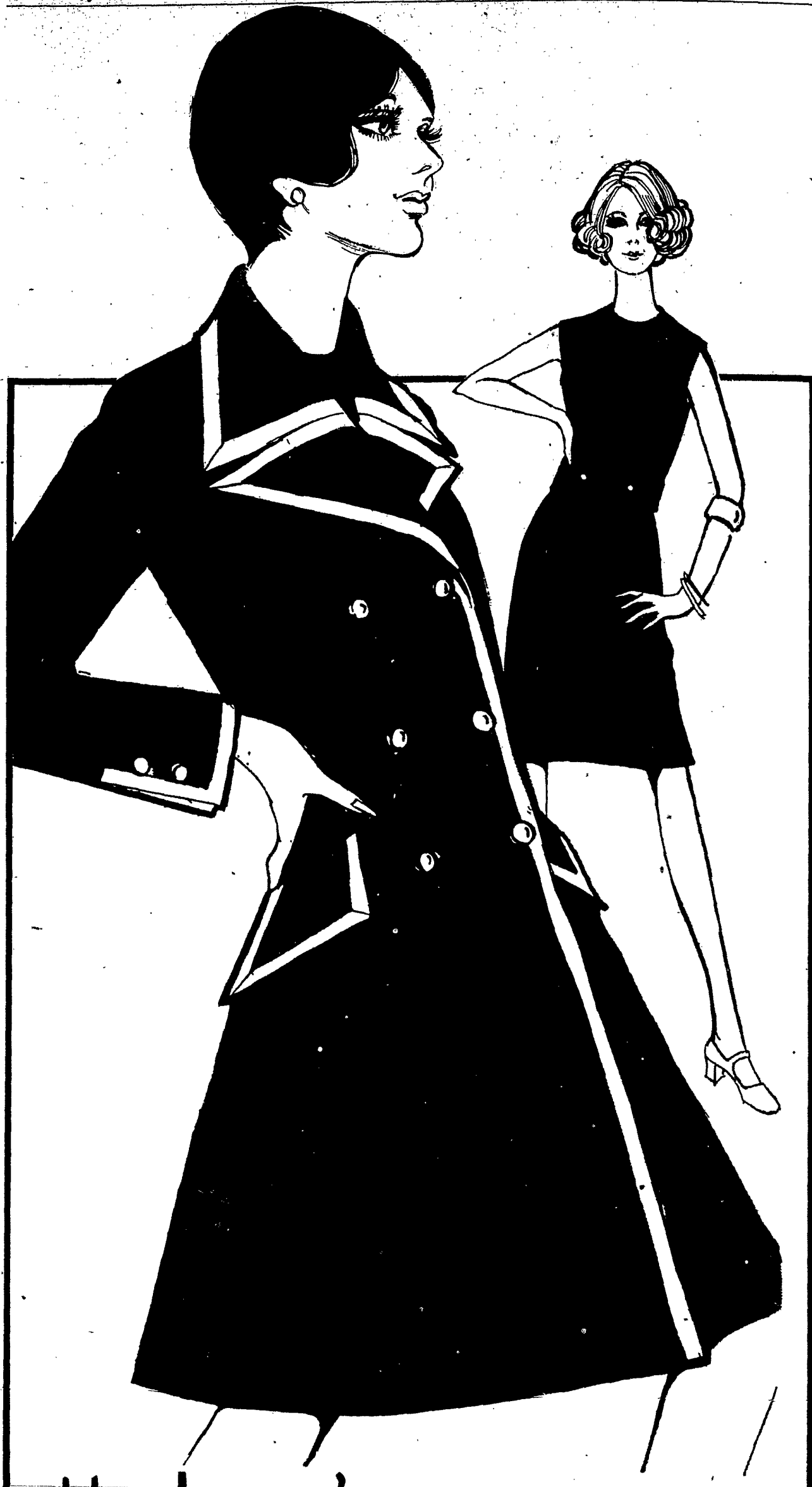
Fresno, Calif. — (RNS) — The giant Tenneco Corporation and S. A. Camp Farms, another major grower in the San Joaquin Valley, have signed contracts with the United Farm Workers Organizing Committee led by Cesar Chavez. The

agreements cover 11,100 acres of grapes in California and Arizona.

Contracts signed were identical to those agreed upon with other growers, calling for \$1.75 per hour, plus incentives and

fringe benefits. An additional clause calls for the addition Dec. 1, of 1,200 acres of plums and other crops.

Tenneco Corporation, a major conglomerate, is also one of the world's top grape producers. At harvest peak, it and the Camp Corporation employ some 2,500 workers.



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
