

A Parish Forms a Council

A little over a year ago, the Pastor of Blessed Sacrament Parish, Father John Norris, and a nucleus of interested parishioners researched the idea of a Parish Council in Blessed Sacrament.

Convinced of its worth and feasibility after a few months of study, the Steering Committee drew up a proposed Constitution and went about the education of the entire parish in this matter.

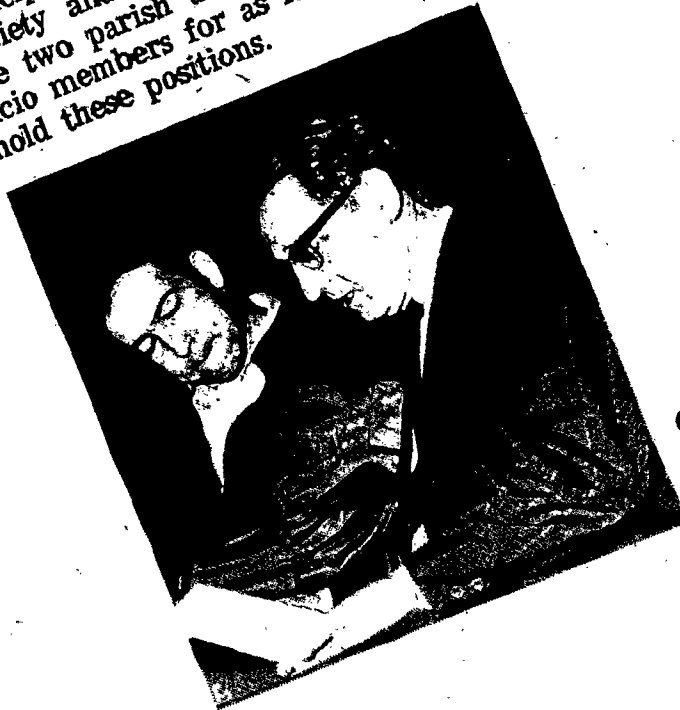

An informative flyer, blurbs in the church bulletin, talks—by both priests and laymen—from the pulpit, and two public parish meetings drew interest and, when it came to a vote, overwhelmingly favorable response from the parishioners.

The Council is composed of twelve lay men and women, elected by the parishioners and serving for a three-year term, these terms being rotated so that four new members and eight experienced members are on each year.

The Pastor, Assistant(s), School Principal, President of the Rosary Society and the Men's Club, and the two parish trustees are ex-officio members for as long as they hold these positions.
