Bishop Joseph Dougherty Dies

Los Angeles—(NC)—Requiem Mass for Bishop Joseph P. Dougherty, 65, who served for nearly a year as auxiliary bishop of Los Angeles, was offered here July 14. Burial was in Yakima, Wash.

Bishop Dougherty was a native of Kansas City, Kan. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1930 and was consecrated on Sept. 26, 1951 to serve as first bishop of the then new diocese of Yakima.

His resignation because of ill health was accepted by Pope Paul VI on Feb. 5, 1969 and a few months later he moved here from Yakima. His health improved, however, and he was assigned as auxiliary bishop of Los Angeles. He died July 10 while vacationing in Washington.

Father Berrigan Still at Large

Baltimore—(NC)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation's hunt for fugitive priest Father Daniel Berrigan, S.J., has taken agents to a Baltimore wedding and a New York City convent.

On June 27, between 20 and 30 uninvited guests showed up at the wedding of Tony and Mary Scoblink in St. Augustine's Lutheran Church here. The agents took up posts at the back of the church.

Earlier, agents searched the New York City provincial house of the Religious of the Sacred Heart of Mary. "They were very nice and apologetic," Sister Jogues Egan, RSHM, the order's provincial said, "as they searched our house from cellar to roof. They went to every one of the six floors."

The FBI has been trying to locate Father Berrigan since April 9, when he failed to report to begin a jail term. He had been convicted of destroying Selective Service records in a raid on a draft office in the Baltimore suburb of Catonsville in May, 1968.

Theologian Named ND Provost

Notre Dame, Ind.—(RNS)—The new post of provost of the University of Notre Dame, which replaces the vice-presidency of academic affairs, will be held by Father James T. Burtchaell, CSC., a dissenter to Pope Paul's stand on birth control.

The 36-year-old native of Portland, Ore., was named to head the theology department in the Spring of 1968. The following Summer Pope Paul VI issued his historic encyclical on birth control. The Notre Dame priest listed himself among the dissenters on the controversial document, calling it "grossly inadequate and largely fallacious."

Detroit See Funds Drug Program

Detroit—(RNS)—The Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit has granted \$24,205 to a community program for helping drug victims.

The money for Self-Help Addiction Rehabilitation (SHAR) was allocated from the special 1968 Archdiocesan Development Fund. A total of \$1 million was earmarked for creative attacks on urban and poverty problems.

More Wisconsin Schools Closed

Milwaukee—(RNS)—Financial problems will close 25 Catholic elementary schools and a Catholic high school in Wisconsin this Fall, according to the Wisconsin Catholic Conference. Thirty-nine schools were closed last Fall.

The Milwaukee Archdiocese reported the largest number of closings—eight elementary schools and one high school. This will leave 202 elementary schools and 24 high schools in the archdiocese. They are expected to enroll 62,278 elementary school pupils and 13,775 high school pupils.

An estimated 160,895 are expected to enroll in the state's 525 remaining Catholic elementary and secondary schools.

Bishops Rap Weekly

Twin Circle Editorial Labeled 'Gross Fraud'

Fresno, Calif. — (RNS) — Five U.S. Catholic bishops, involved in mediating a farm-labor dispute here, accused the editor of a conservative Catholic weekly of perpetrating a "gross fraud" on the Catholic community in its interpretation of the bishops' work.

In a statement issued here July 15, members of the U.S. Bishops Ad Hoc Committee on the Farm-Labor Dispute charged Father Daniel Lyons, S.J., editor of *Twin Circle*, a national Catholic publication, with "bungling interference" during a crucial negotiations period.

Father Lyons had charged that the bishops' committee was engaged in fostering "compulsory unionism" and "intends to dedicate its efforts to organizing all of the farm workers of America," a program, he said, that was beyond the scope of the committee's assignment.

Citing an editorial in the July 12 issue of *Twin Circle* which, the bishops said, purports to review the five-year California grape strike dispute and the committee's role in it, the prelates stated:

"It is incredible that a publication calling itself 'Catholic' should publish such a collection of untruths, innuendos, distortions and plain inaccuracies in interpreting the views and motives of ad hoc committee members, all of whom are bishops, speaking for and acting in the name of the entire American hierarchy."

The bishops committee, chaired by Auxiliary Bishop Joseph F. Donnelly of Hartford, Conn., also includes Archbishop Timothy Manning of Los Angeles, Bishop Hugh A. Donohue of Fresno, Bishop Walter Curtis

of Bridgeport, Conn., and Bishop Humberto Medeiros of Brownsville, Tex.

In their statement on the editorial, the bishops said "we believe it to be a gross fraud on

the Catholic community."

In his *Twin Circle* editorial, Father Lyons criticized the bishops' committee for "not listening to the pastors involved or their parishioners."
