House Unit Attacks Report on Smut

Washington, D.C. — (RNS) — A tentative finding that pornography has no significance in the development of the criminal has been challenged by a House subcommittee.

The report of the Presidential Commission on Obscenity and Pornography has been called into question even before its official release.

The report, "leaked" to the House subcommittee on postal operations, stressed that "there is no (available scientific) evidence that exposure to pornography operates as a cause of misconduct in either youth or adults."

On the other hand, "sex offenders generally report sexually repressive family backgrounds, immature and inade-

quate sexual histories and rigid and conservative attitudes concerning sexuality," the report stated.

"All of the available scientific evidence suggests that pornography is neither a powerful activator nor initiator of sexual behavior. Research indicates that erotic materials do not contribute to the development of character deficits nor operate as a significant factor in anti-social behavior or in crime and delinquency causation," according to the report.

The report stirred considerable "concern" in the House postal operations subcommittee, which scheduled public hearings for this week. The hearings were designed to test

7 Carmelite Priests Take Diocese Duties

Diocesan educational and pastoral work received a significant lift this week as seven Carmelite Fathers were assigned to duties in Rochester.

Five priests will teach in high schools, one will be a professor at Nazareth College and one will pursue degree work at the University of Rochester. The group will supply weekend assistance in area parishes, the Pastoral Office indicated.

In announcing the appointments through the Pastoral Office, Very Rev. Lawrence Mooney, prior of the Carmelite Fathers' New York Province, said that the move was fulfillment of a pledge made to Bishop Hogan when the Carmelites announced the closing of their high school in Auburn two months ago.

"We offered our services to the diocese at that time for whatever work the Bishop wished to use our talents," he said.

"Although forced to close Mt. Carmel High School because of steadily declining enrollment, we are glad to be able to leave part of the priest-faculty in the diocese to help the educational and pastoral apostolate of this area."

The appointments are: Fathers Coleman Logan and Daniel Lynch to the faculty of McQuaid Jesuit High School; Fathers Brian Murphy and Kevin Driscoll to the faculty of Nazareth Academy; Father Timothy Donohue to teach at Nazareth College; Father Joseph De
