

Tips From The Labs

For several years our laboratory has been concerned about the hazards of lead poisoning involved in the use of certain types of imported ceramic dishware, mostly from Mexico and the Far East.

We discovered that this dishware contains lead, and that acidic foods and beverages may leach out the lead. To avoid this risk, such dishware should not be used for food.

We have also found that there is lead in ceramic glazings sold for use in arts and crafts. Items made from these glazings should also not be used for foods.

Edmundites Re-elect Superior

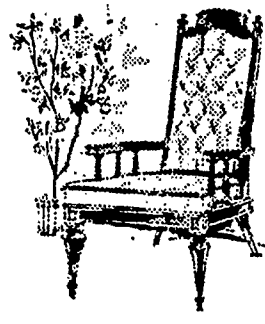
Winooski, Vt. — (RNS)—Father Eymard P. Galligan, SSE., has been re-elected superior general of the Society of St. Edmund.

Survey Shows Sisters Happy In Teaching

attraction" which permits Sisters to choose apostolic works which interest them, there is fear that a substantial number of the young religious will not enter the teaching field.

"Research within the diocese seems to indicate," the report said, "that unless imaginative, bold, forceful and immediate planning and restructuring takes place in our diocese, the elementary apostolate will fail to attract sufficient numbers of religious to continue the large scale diocesan commitment to this apostolate."

Discussing the care and support of retired Sisters, the diocesan report revealed that lack of retirement benefits from the government or from parishes and diocese is a serious handicap to the religious communities.

Medical insurance for elementary school Sisters did not begin generally until 1964 and many Sisters in the secondary schools are not covered by Blue Cross-Blue Shield even yet.

A fair-wage scale and a retirement policy similar to that covering diocesan priests seems needed at once, the report said, to enable the Sisters' congregations to take care of themselves and support the infirm and the aged. The declining base of support (fewer Sisters working than a decade ago) and rising costs for educating teachers and running convents have seriously damaged the congregations' economy.

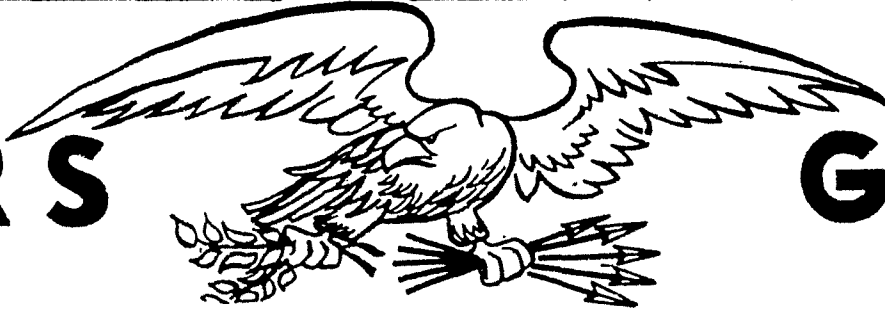
