Aquinas Stadium, A Last Look?

During the Second World War over 3,300 Aquinas Institute alumni were scattered over the fields of combat. Ninety-eight did not return. Scores of others returned wounded, some permanently.

In appreciation for these Aquinas men who had given their lives, and in gratitude to all the others who had fought for the service of their country, a plan was conceived by faculty members, parents and alumni which would be a lasting tribute to the Aquinas War Dead—the erection of Aquinas Memorial Stadium.

Father Hugh Haffey, CSB, was appointed chairman of the committee and Frank Leahy of Notre Dame was invited to speak at the kickoff dinner in the Aquinas cafeteria.

The people of Rochester contributed \$132,000 to help build the stadium. Faced with post-war rising costs and the desire to build an adequate facility, the Basilian Fathers of Aquinas accepted the obligation of underwriting the deficit of \$405,000.

On Oct. 2, 1949, one of the finest high school stadiums in

the country was made available to the citizens of Rochester. A cement structure reinforced with steel, the stadium has a seating capacity of 20,000. There is a parking area for 2,200 cars.

The Basilian Fathers found it increasingly difficult to find the necessary funds to meet interest and principal payments each year. In the face of dwindling crowds, abetted by the advent of television, box office receipts hardly took care of operating expenses.

And yet the vision and determination of the Aquinas administrators never once let them compromise their objectives. Payments were met. In spite of increased costs, all sports remained in the school's physical education program.

In June of last year the Aquinas Board of Trustees, composed of the Bishop of Rochester, prominent laymen, and members of the Basilian Fathers

community were faced with the problem of paying for needed renovations in the Dewey Avenue School. They found the stadium to be a financial liability and recommended it be sold, preferably to an organization which would maintain it as a stadium.

The Brodsky Realty Corp. of Brighton and Cleveland Housing Development of Ohio each offered \$800,000 for the stadium and its 19.2 acres. This amount would meet the school's present indebtedness.

A citizens committee headed up by Charles A. Schiano, an attorney and general manager of the Rochester Lancers soccer team, is presently urging the County of Monroe to purchase and operate the stadium.

According to Father Albert L. Gaelens, C.S.B., principal, Aquinas will accept one of the land developers' offers unless a more satisfactory offer is received.
