"She started off with the agency, when it was much smaller, as the chief statistical analyst," Miss Catherine Wobus, placement director, recalled. "Then during the war she moved into home finding."

"She was always in good humor, always willing to extend herself to find homes no matter how difficult the case would be."

Mrs. Bernadette Slater, Mrs. Keller's supervisor, said that in the 20 years she has known Mrs.

Keller she was always "the very warm kind of person you can call upon whenever you have a need."

"She was always receptive and considerate of both the foster parents and the child, who is reaching out for a home."
