would give up the tax money they receive from upstate."

His opponents, Liberal George M. Michaels, Republican L.S. Riford Jr., and Democrat John C. Rossi all said no although Rossi feels that "if a sufficent number of people evidenced a desire to accomplish this separation, then it should be a matter for serious study."

In the 130th district. Conservative Richard Popowych approves the proposal stating; "We can no longer afford them."

Democratic Liberal Michael Slade takes the opposite stance "Monroe County problems would not disappear by erecting new legal entities around ourselves."

Assemblyman Raymond J. Lill of the 131st district also favors making New York City a separate state, stating:

"With 7.7 million people in New York City and the many problems of their own it would be better for upstate if the city was a separate state."

Nicholas R. Santoro, the Republican incumbent, remarked, "The concept has no real validity. It is no solution to the very individual problems that New York City experiences."

In the 134th district, Assemblyman William M. Steinfeldt, Republican, indicated he supports the step.

"This question requires further study as to how such a proposal would be carried out. Equities for all concerned need to be preserved. Certainly such a question should be placed in a referendum."

John A. Damico, the Democrat-Liberal nominee in the 134th, disagrees, saying, "It would be a serious blunder for us to cop out and try to divorce ourselves from our responsibilities and our Christian obligations to administer to the needs of others."

Among the federal candidates, Richard L. Ottinger, Democrat, although not indicating a yes or no answer, stated, "A referendum on this question would be worthwhile."

Conservative James L. Buckley answered a simple no and the third candidate, Republican Sen. Charles Goodell, did not reply.

Not one of the candidates for the U.S. House of Representatives indicated an affirmative response on the subject.
