Stress Dangers Of Drug Abuse Pope Tells Doctors

Vatican City — (NC)—Pope Paul VI told a group of Italian doctors it is their duty to "speak out loudly" against the dangers of drug abuse.

For the past few months the Pope has devoted special attention to the growing problem of drugs, a problem of such concern to him that he has established a center in the Vatican state secretariat to keep track of day-by-day developments in the field.

His latest speech on the subject was made Oct. 18 to a group of Italian doctors who had met in Rome to discuss the drug problem, which has surfaced only recently in Italy.

The Pope said doctors must teach everyone who is concerned about the health of man, and particularly the health of the younger generations . . . what these mysterious drugs are that are now spreading like a dangerous disease, encouraged by a secret and commercial traffic."

Doctors, he said, "must denounce the gravity of a danger which threatens to spread all the more as the allure becomes greater and as the commercial interests which favor it become wider and vaster."

The Pope said that men today listen more attentively to doctors than to others and that doctors, therefore, must "speak out loudly while we still have time to ward off the spreading and the social degeneration of the drug phenomenon."

The Pope pledged the Church's cooperation in facing the drug problem.

Priests, parents, teachers, everyone "in positions of responsibility," he said, "should be sensitive to the tremendous and insidious phenomenon of the spreading of drugs and should be exhorted to see to it that this phenomenon should be properly watched and limited."

Turn in Used Clothing To Help World's Poor

The 22nd annual Catholic Relief Services Thanksgiving Clothing Collection for the needy overseas asks that used clothing, shoes, bedding and other garments be delivered to Catholic churches during the week of Nov. 8.

Bishop Hogan has appointed Father Chester M. Klocek, pastor of St. Leo's, Hilton, to head the campaign. Assisting Father Klocek are Father Elmer Schmidt, assistant pastor of St. Vincent de Paul's Church, Corning, and Father Conrad J. Sundholm, assistant pastor of St. Mary's, Auburn.

All Catholic churches will be accepting serviceable, used clothing, shoes and other materials during the collection, and these supplies will then be

shipped overseas and distributed to the needy in 70 countries through the facilities of Catholic Relief Services.

Father Klocek announced that for the first time in the history of the clothing collection, Catholic Relief Services will set aside a certain portion of the donated nationwide total for reserve at the agency's warehouse in Brooklyn to fulfill domestic needs from any disasters and emergencies during the forthcoming year.

Last year, a total of 405,540 pounds of clothing and other material was donated by the people of the Diocese of Rochester, while the nationwide collection totaled more than 20 million pounds.

lar of every four raised in the Rochester Diocese on Nov. 22, will stay here, Father Hempel said. These monies will finance new self-help programs.

"We are interested in all the poor as people, not just as Catholics or whites or blacks or church-goers", Father Hempel said.

"We will use these new funds to help them find self-determination, by assisting them to get a better home, find a job or start a small business."

None of the current programs of the Office of Human Concern in either city or rural areas will be funded from the Human Development campaign. But Father Hempel indicated that educational efforts for migrant and inner-city children, housing needs in Elmira and Rochester as well as in rural areas of Wayne, Steuben and Yates counties, plus clinics and new "houses of concern" in disadvantaged areas are being contemplated.

Prelate Endorses 'Selective Objection'

Kyoto, Japan — (RNS) — Roman Catholic Archbishop Angelo Fernandes of New Delhi, India, has appealed for establishment "of the right of conscientious objection" to "particular wars."

Such wars, he said at a World Conference on Religion and Peace here, would be those "in which weapons of mass destruction are likely to be used, or military orders issued that involved the commission of war crimes or crimes against humanity."

peal. Only three favored retention of the present statute.

Seven legislative candidates did not answer the survey at all and 21 of the total 74 candidates did not reply. Others took ambiguous stands and the Courier-Journal urged editorially that voters should pin these candidates down on their views before Nov. 3.

Some form of public aid to private schools drew overwhelming support from the 46 candidates for state legislative office, with 28 favoring assistance and only 6 opposed.

Of the total 74, which included federal and state executive candidates, 44 support some form of private school aid while only 8 do not.

All individual positions on school aid were listed in the Oct. 7 issue.
