## Faculty Enrichment Day Set at Cardinal Mooney

This Friday, Nov. 20, Cardinal Mooney High School students will have a holiday, while their teachers participate in a Faculty Enrichment Day, the first of four such programs which will take place during the Mooney school year,

"The purpose of our first program," states Sister M. Maureen, vice principal, "is to explore the possibilities of innovative development of the master schedule, and to prepare faculty members for more imaginative development in curriculum planning."

The keynote address, "The Process of Change", will describe the need of innovative teaching and the new role of the teacher in such an educational environment. It will be given by Frank Kamp, fomerly assistant principal and director of studies at King's Preparatory, and currently curriculum coordinator of Catholic Secondary Schools.

Faculty members will have the choice of attending two out of three seminars dealing with various aspects of innovative instruction. The three seminars, which will be run simultaneously at 10 a.m. and 11 a.m., are:

Team Teaching and Departmental Planning, piloted by George Adler, chairman of the Social Studies Department of Sperry High School, located in the Rush-Henrietta School district, an area which has experimented with team teaching for some time.

Use of Unstructured Time, co-conducted by Paul Fauth, principal of Arcadia High School in Greece, who will present the administrator's point of view of unstructured time, and Father Lawrence Murphy, diocesan director of vocations, formerly of King's Preparatory, who will describe the guidance counselor's role with regard to the student's use of unstructur-

Following a noon summary report of the three seminars, there will be a luncheon for all participants.


