A Good Plan For Stadium

A month away from home produced at least one pleasing result — Aquinas Stadium is still up for grabs.

Local letter writers (most of them against public ownership of the stadium) are now suggesting those 25,000 "Save Our Stadium" petitioners fork up \$40 each to cover the dollars Aquinas needs to get for its stadium to cover school repair costs.

That's a good idea. Rochester still has professional baseball because the fans took that route to retain the sport.

Surprised to see, however, that Aquinas only put \$24,777 in the bank, resulting from stadium rental, parking and concessions.

That's not much of an incentive for anyone to buy it.

Aquinas explained, however, that it only charged minimum fees because it is a tax-exempt property. Which of course explains why the soccer Rochester Lancers are so vitally interested in retaining the park — would they get the same kind of subsidy if they played their games at Silver Stadium?

Some letter writers referred to the stadium as a "crumbling coliseum." While no one denies it needs some refurbishing, it isn't about to fall down tomorrow. Silver Stadium, much older, has better chances to do that and it's still standing.

APPARENTLY Aquinas will have to get its kicks from playing Rush-Henrietta in ice hockey only.

The recent revelation of the Monroe County League's future football plans leaves little chance for Catholic and county schools to meet in football.

The county league, whose school administrators are voting on realignment this week, are expected to select a three division setup which calls for cross-division games, not cross-league contests.
