Homes for Teenagers

A call for foster homes for teenagers who have been displaced from their homes by family divorce, death, illness or neglect, went out this week from the Catholic Family Center of Rochester.

According to Catherine Wobus, casework director of the center, "Interest and firm guidance from foster parents will provide these children with their last chance to 'tune in' to society and family life."

Miss Wobus described three separate cases under her purview.

Jimmy, just turned 15. His father died suddenly six years ago, and two years later his mother died. Jimmy is pleasant but reserved.

He has long hair, and when the pressures mount, he wanders in the Rochester area. He is bright but has never done too well in school because of his hurt feelings. He urgently needs parents who are interested but firm and will not permit him to turn them off.

John, 12, is a product of a

broken home. He and his father have never had a close relationship. John is testing and quick to anger. A slow boy and easily frustrated, he needs loving, firm parents who will stick by him.

Jane, 15, has been raised in a disorganized family. Her father is alcoholic. Her mother has no hope for either herself or her daughter's future. She nags Jane constantly—almost pushing Jane into delinquent behavior. Jane especially needs a warm mother who will talk over her behavior with her—allow her choices when appropriate and when not, to set limits.

Catholic Family Center provides casework counseling for the youngsters and advice and support to the foster parents.

The center also pays board to the foster parents, medical care, clothing and other incidentals, according to Miss Wobus.

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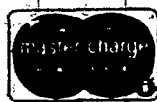
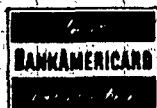
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
