

School Election

Training Ground for Future

Thousands of Greece teens will awaken to their new civic responsibility next fall when the 18-year-old vote goes into effect. The Action For People Association (AFPA) of Cardinal Mooney High School educated future voters to exercise their responsibility during the election, last week, of Mooney's largest extracurricular organization.

The officers of AFPA were elected by voting procedures closely paralleling civic elections.

Campaigning began Feb. 10, and culminated on the 18th with the actual voting in which Patrick Tydings and Sandy Hertzler were elected president and vice president.

As in the real election, those wishing to vote had to register and three dates were set aside for that.

Did the inconvenience of registration discourage many students from voting? Said Louis D'Amato, former AFPA treasurer, "If they can't find time to register, they shouldn't vote."

Paulette Namisnak agreed. "We wanted the kids who vote to care. They had to see it as more than a popularity contest."

As it happened, the registration turnout was a little less

than the national average of 43 per cent. Thirty-eight per cent of the student body and faculty turned out to register with this breakdown: seniors: 34 per cent; juniors: 63 per cent; sophomores: 30 per cent; freshmen: 30 per cent; and faculty 63.

Tom McDonald, former president of the AFPA, said that the vote-for-your-buddy attitude is obsolete. "Kids today are sensitive to politics. They want to show their responsibility."

The campaign and election were intended to be a learning experience. In the words of the

AFPA moderator, Sister Virginia Wilson, "We're not teaching with textbook, we're teaching through experience."

The student voters aren't the only ones to benefit from this type of education. The candidates learn too, even those who lose.

Barb DeCarlo, a former vice presidential candidate, found initiative to become a "teen leader" on McCurdy's Teen Board. "I've always liked helping people," Barb said, "but if I hadn't lost that election, I would never have gone out and joined Teen Board."

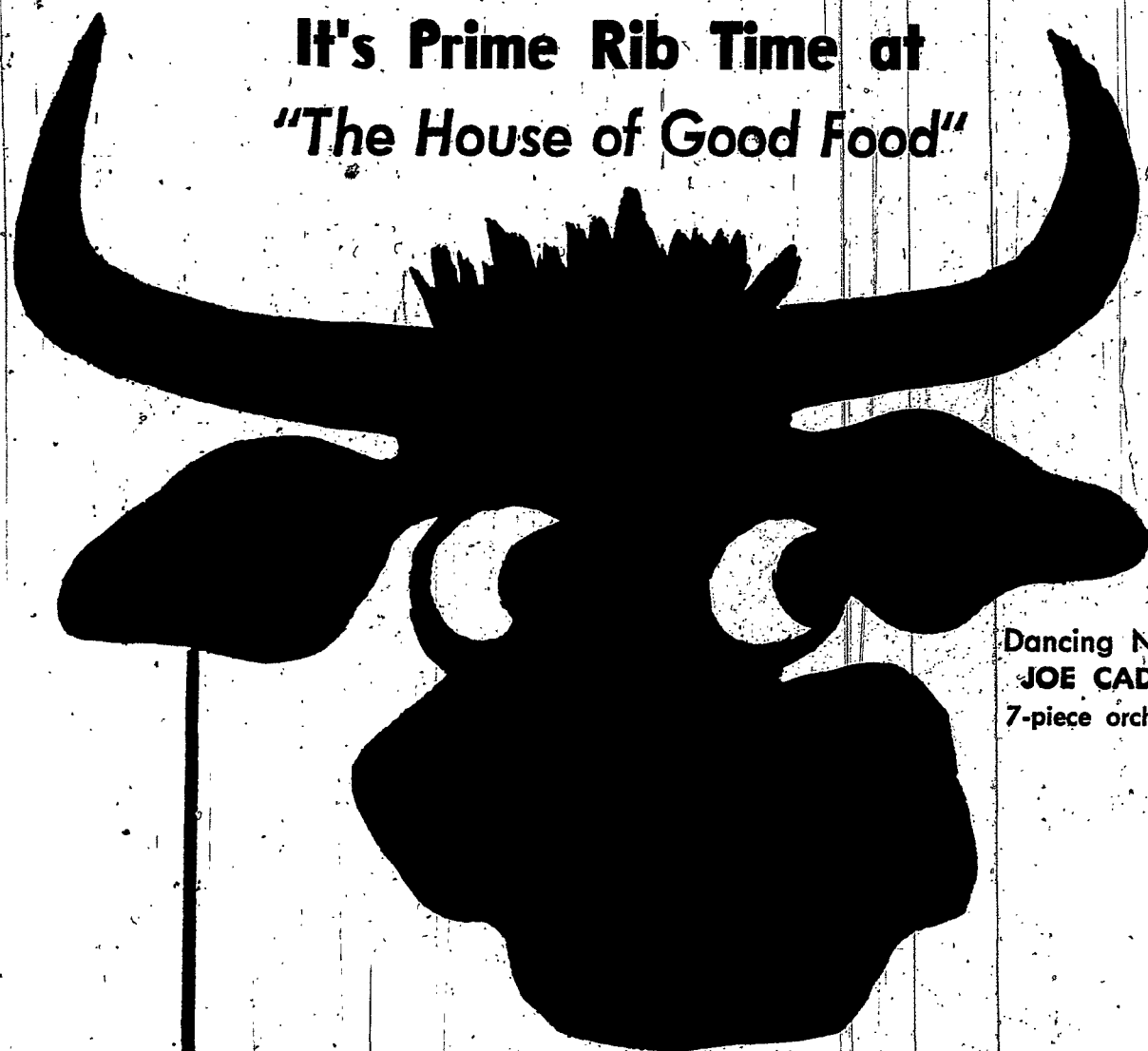
The Men's Club of St. Cecilia's will be guests of the Ladies Guild Tuesday night, March 2.
