Star Issues Challenge

The president of a chain of supermarkets serving this area has proposed that volume of business be the gauge for deter-mining if retail stores should be open on Sunday.

Wallace E. Fearnley of Star Supermarkets proposed that all - supermarkets, depart. stores ment stores and others-over 3,000 square feet or which do \$100,000 worth of business or more a year, might not be al-lowed to operate on Sundays

He further says that special provision might have to be made for drugstores, for health reasons.

"This," Fearnley said, "would tend to cool antagonisms among the major competitors and still allow the 'mom and pop' shops to survive and meet the legitimate needs of the Sunday

Stating that Star had been drawn into² the blue law controversy when it decided to keep open its new store in Webster Plaza because of the proximity of a seven-day-a-week competitor, Fearnley nonethe-less said that Star does not subscribe to Sunday selling.

Citing economic ("it is costly and unnecessary expense") and religious ("observance of the Sabbath should be respected wherever possible) factors, Fearnley said that for years Star has urged that Sunday

thoughtful consideration," he said. "that we decided to remain open in Webster; indeed hoping that this action would force the issue and that one final across-the-board decision would resolve the question once and for ill."

"The law is unclear, unworkable and has proven time and again to be totally unenforceable."

After an investigation at the Webster store Feb. 28, Dist. Atty, Jack B. Lazarus indicated he would seek an indictment against Star Supermarkets for failing to comply with the law.

The Star executive said, "We heartily endorse decisive action by the district attorney and further recognize this obliga-tion to enforce what continues to be the law of the land."

"Star," he continued, "does not condone the flagrant viola-tion of this or any other law, and presently has no plans to extend'Sunday shopping hours to its other un
