Pope Stresses Importance of Church Communications

Vatican City (RNS) Pope Paul has reaffirmed the neces sity of the Church to utilize all media of social communication 'to assert its presence in the world" and transmit the mes-sage of the Gospel amid a "confused and often contradictory mass of human verbiage and conflicting ideologies.

He also warned against Catholics who use the media to "divide" and "disorient."

The Pope addressed a meeting of the Pontifical Commission on Social Communication, including representatives of international Catholic press, radiò, agencies.

He observed that the part the Church plays "in the ocean of modern social communications" could be compared with "a slender trickle," so that its voice "sometimes seems submerged and impotent."

""But the Church," he emphasized, "must assert its presence. in the world of public opinion," and do all it can "to pass on the Word of God, the evangelical message (even) in the midst of the confused and often contradictory mass of human

television, and film **verbiage and conflicting ide**-cies. **ologies.**"

Pope Paul said the Church, should always be conscious of, and faithful to, two principles: "the vision of the world in the light of Catholic thought, and the spiritual and apostolic finality toward which all means should be employed for the good of all."

"Our aim," he went on. "is not purely informative or cultural, but also apologetic (i.e., in defense of Catholic positions) and pedagogic or instructive."

The Pope spoke of a problem

about which, he said, he felt "very strongly," namely, "the spirit which must always guide the mind and activities of those who dedicate themselves to social communications within the Church.'

"It seems to us," he said, "that, unfortunately, there are groups and centers that are not always guided by an authentically Catholic spirit." Instead, they use communication media to divide, disorient, and corrode unity, he said.

"We are thinking of the harm done by such groups in their publications and by their dis-

semination of news of a corrosive and protesting nature --- a dissemination that creates a dangerous disorientation, a widespread uncertainty among Catholics, who, today, more than ever, must be united to face the confusion of ideas and the leveling down of stan-dards of public and private morals!"

The pontiff appealed for "beneficial and vital criticism in the bosom of the Church," but asked that it always, be based on honest appraisals of facts and on fidelity to truth . and charity.

New York —(RNS)—Terence Cardinal Cooke predicted that the parents of parochial school students in New York State will receive tax-funded¹ state assistance this year.

Commenting on a growing campaign by the Church in beunder consideration in the leghalf of a parent-aid bill now islature, the prelate said, "I think WO are going to be suce cessful."

His remarks came during a brief talk to several hundred Catholic high school the hers.

Of projected Catholic school closings if aid is not forthcom-ing, Cardinal Cooke said, "We are not bluffing." He reiterated his earlier warning that Catholic schools would be forced to shut down if some kind of gov-ernmental assistance is not provided soon,

sentation on their area board they would share in discussion of all regional issues and would help "pursue goals too local for the diocese and too large for the individual parish", according to the Bishop's direc-

Each regional unit would de-cide on the necessity of consolidation of certain schools where advisable, It would push improvement and coordination of religious instruction programs, arrange busing for public and parochial schoolers, adult education programs and teacher

Responsibility for teacher qualification, curriculum, scheduling and coordination will probably remain in the Schools² Office and the Religious Ed/CCD division in Roches-

In a short while, Father Sha-mon indicated, the supra-parochial concept of cooperation through regional grouping would help every other phase of diocesan activity.

Furthering of the liturgical renewal, promotion of the human development campaign, establishment, and functioning of the Diocesan Pastoral Council, meetings of clergy and laity and general support of any projects touching the entire diocese eventually will profit he said.

regions in Monroe County, will 'hopefully be based on relationship of each area to one of the Rochester inner city par-ishes," Father Shamon said.

"In the 'advise-and-consent age' of submitting our prostage' tem chart to the priests," he said, "we will propose an outreach program which will involuntary inter-parish sponsorship of an inner-city parish."

Each regional unit will eventually have a center, the Office of Education hopes. In regions where schools have been consolidated, a vacant school or convent should be turned over to the region as an educational center.

The center would be the source of service and administration for the total educational apostolate in that region, Father Shamon said, serving adults as well as children. It would focus a new thrust to improve and coordinate the CCD programs, adult education programs for the region and teacher training courses.

Works of the Family Life Apostolate, the campus ministry and regional meetings of clergy, Sisters and laity would occur in the center.

"We know we must regional-e," Father Shamon said, ""to ize." improve the thrust of education - reaching all children and adults better — and improving the quality of the religious and the secular courses."

Him crucified — a stumbling block to the Jews, and foolish-ness to the Gentiles" — we believe, we KNOW, that God loves us. We realize that we never need be alone — need never despair.

The reality of God's love is not something read in a news-paper article—but it could be discourd in the reality of the source o discerned in the quiet of a reflective prayer, by a person of faith. The reality of God's love will never be known at all by some, because no one ever told them or showed them that they were lovable.

I wonder if someone will die tonight, (or even continue living tonight) without ever having experienced the fact that they are lovable. If they do, then certainly the lesson of Lent is lacking in their life. Christ is not a reality to that person. There is no Christian living the reality that he professes, at least as far as that person is concerned. I wonder if that person is somebody I know.
