Kids Get Active In Elmira Liturgy

Elmira — Pupils at Our Lady of Lourdes here have become fully involved in Lenten Masses, by participating and by inject-ing their own ideas.

Monday through Friday at 11 15 a.m. pupils from each class are responsible for supplying features to the Mass.

Everything from scenarios to folk singing has been performed by the pupils.

Father Roy Kiggins usually officates at the special Mass and has had some unexpected moments.

"Quite often I don't even know what they plan to do. I just wait and find out at the same time as those attending Mass do," Father Kiggins said.

The assistant pastor says the youngsters' involvement in the Mass "is a learning experience for them and also a learning experience for me.'

He recalled the time when the eighth grade class decided to hold a Latin Mass on St. Patrick's Day.

"It had been about five years since we had a full Latin Mass at Lourdes and I had to brush up on some of the things," Father Kiggins said.

Episcopalians Try New Rites

Rochester Episcopalians will soon try out an entirely new revision of the Prayer Book, re-cently approved by the Episcopal General Convention.

The new rites will be celc-brated for a period of six months, at the urging of Bish-op Robert J. Spears.


The revision of the Prayer Book comes only four years after the General Convention issued a "pretty radical change" in the better than 300-year-old liturgy according to The Rev. Gerald Moser, assistant minister at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Rochester.

Father Moser explained that the new revision of the Prayer Book offers five optional rites for Eucharistic Celebration and simply outlines the procedures for the "lesser" rites. He de-scribed the book as "freewheeling."

Do You Recognize Him? The early Christians experienced the Risen Lord in several

ways as expressed in the Resurrection episode in Scripture. Except when the Apostles were gathered together (in "community") the people to whom Jesus appeared did not recognize Him at first.

Mary thought He was the gardener; the disciples on the road to Emmaus thought He was just another traveller; and the apostles fishing on the lake thought He was probably just another fisherman.

But to each of these Jesus revealed Himself by a word or by the breaking of bread. To each of these He gave a mission. He to find Him still present in each other!

Today is no different. The Lord comes to us, and yet we often don't recognize Him. He is present still among us; He speaks to us in His Word; and He is present in the Breaking of the Bread. Like Maryl the travellers, and the apostles, He leaves with us a mission to go to the others and tell them the Good News that He is risen — He is God — we are saved!

We could all give endless examples of our personal experiences of God, be it an experience of love, prayer, community, birth and death, or happiness and sorrow. God is present and acting in our lives so much we often don't realize it. But when we DO experience God in our life, do we go out exclaiming our Good News to others?

We are all called to "propagate our faith," and we do in many vays. Our actions alone witness to others our inner motivations that which "moves" us to act or react.) When others experience ove, trust, patience, and goodness from you, do they not experi-nce something of God, if your life is motivated by Christ's life vithin you?.

Easter and Christmas remind us of this. Unfortunately the Easter "spirit," like the Christmas spirit, dwindles away (after the lilles die, the new clothes are worn, and the Easter baskets re empty) and we go about our business not grasping the joy each day holds with each experience of people relating with beople.
