Elmira Principal Named

Elmira—Sister Clare Francis Mogenhan, SSJ, has been appointed principal of the new Catholic Regional Junior High School for Chemung County. She currently is principal of Immaculate Conception School in Ithaca.

The new junior high school is part of a developing consolidation program for Catholic schools in Chemung County. The school will be located in the present St. Patrick's Elementary School near downtown Elmira.

Sister Clare was appointed to the post by Sister Mary

Agnes, regional superintendent of schools. The appointment was approved by members of the Chemung County Catholic School Board.

Sister Clare is a member of the National Association of Elementary School Principals, National Catholic Educational Association, and has served as secretary for the past two years for the Southern Tier Association of Catholic Schools.

While serving as principal in Ithaca, she organized one of the first Catholic parish school boards in the diocese.

She was also responsible for the establishment of a well-equipped learning center and inaugurated programing in the departmental grades to "enable children to freely choose their academic schedule and to discover themselves in their independent choices and decisions. Segments of free time have permitted children to enjoy the fun of learning and to discover learning can be fun."

She will assume her new principal's position in the middle of July.

"I understand this is an experimental set up, designed to use facilities, faculty and other personnel to the best advantage," she said. "There is a marvelous faculty to work with, all Elmira teachers, and I think that is a good thing."

The faculty includes eight lay people—five women and three men; four St. Joseph sisters besides the principal; two Mercy sisters full time and two others who teach music in area schools.

The new principal has taught nearly all grades in schools including Rochester's Immaculate Conception and Sacred Heart Cathedral; Mother of Sorrows, Greece; St. Rose, Lima, and St. Mary's, Dansville.

She is a daughter of Mrs. Edward B. Mogenhan of Terrace Park, Rochester, and a graduate of St. Monica's School, Nazareth Academy and Nazareth College. In addition to her master's degree studies at Cortland, she has done graduate work at the University of Rochester, Ithaca College and Hartford University.

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Working Class Discussion Held

Archie Bunker, the hero of CBS comedy "All in the Family" is not only a spade-calling Knave of Hearts, he's also a symbol of a vast number of Americans who are rising into political maturity: the white working class American.

The problems of the group and some solutions to those problems were the subject of day-long consultation held last week at Monroe Community College, under the sponsorship of an Ad Hoc Committee for Consultation on Working Class Americans.

Headed by the Rev. Ron Richardson, Pastor of East Side Me-

morial Presbyterian Church, the committee brought together nearly 100 community organizers, religious, and media people with noted authorities in the field. Several persons connected with the Roman Catholic Office of Human Development were on the steering committee.

The major speaker of the day was Irving M. Levine, urban projects director for the American Jewish Committee. Levine, long recognized across the country as one of the first to organize the political potential of the white ethnic community, addressed himself to the challenges and frustrations faced

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
