

Academic Fair Set At Nazareth College

Nazareth College will throw open the doors of its classrooms, studios and workshops to all in the Rochester area who want a first-hand look at academic life today during an all-day "Academic Fair" on Wednesday, April 28. The open house is sponsored by the college's Continuing Education Department.

The program is aimed at those whose education has been interrupted and are interested in beginning or resuming their college education either for credit or self-enrichment. More than 40 classes will be open to visitors. Course offerings provide fine arts, humanities, social and natural sciences. Classes

range from Jewelry to Marriage and Family, Emergent Man to Child Psychology, History of Theater to Modern Poetry.

According to Sister Barbara Ann, director of Continuing Education, Nazareth's Academic Fair "is the result of conversations that led to two conclusions: there are adults convinced that formal education should recognize no age barrier; and people are apprehensive, resuming formal education after several years.
