Youngsters Help Prepare For May 1 CCD Institute

For most young people, Easter week is a time of relaxation.

This wasn't the case for several eighth graders in the CCD class of Sister Alice Cooney, S.S.J., elementary coordinator for the diocesan Office of Religious Education-CCD.

They devoted precious hours of their Easter vacation to help the Office of Religious Education finish frenetic, last minute preparations for the fourth annual "Lay Catechist Institute."

The institute, a major event on the CCD calendar, will take place on May 1 at Mercy High School. This year it will focus on the "how" of religious education methods and techniques.

Two speakers of national prominence in the field of religious education will speak — Father Carl Pfeifer, S.J., and Sister Janaan Manternach, OSF.

Theology Talks Examine Faith

The Rochester School of Lay Theology will present its spring lecture series on Monday evenings, April 26 through May 17. Each lecture will begin at 8 p.m. at Colgate Rochester/Bexley Hall/Crozer Seminary, 1100 S. Goodman.

The theme of the series is The Christian Faith: Definition and Description. The question will be discussed from four viewpoints. On April 26 Dr. Arthur McKay, seminary president will speak on Faith Versus Religion. He will elaborate on the essence of Christianity as seen by those who train Christian ministers today.

On May 3 Father Henry Atwell, pastor of St. Agnes Church in Avon, will discuss What Did Jesus Really Teach? He will discuss the essentials of the Christian faith from the pastoral side.

On May 10 the Reverend Kenneth Cauthen, professor of Christian Theology at the seminary will talk on The Church and The Future. He will deal with the problem of modern man trying to be a Christian in today's technological society.

On May 17 Bishop Daniel Corrigan, dean of Bexley Hall, will speak on If These Things Be True, What Do These Demand of Me? Bishop Corrigan will discuss commitment to the Christian faith.

The public is invited. Registration fee for the series is \$3 or \$1 per lecture.

'Oliver Twist' On St. Jerome School Stage

"Oliver Twist" the stage adaptation of Charles Dickens' famous novel about child labor in England during the middle 19th century steps beyond the fringe Wednesday, April 28, at 7:30 p.m. in the St. Jerome school hall, East Rochester.

The production will be staged by children of the school under the direction of Miss Katherine Mock. Oliver is played by Brian Baynes; Fagin by Dan Bilak; Nancy by Laurie Magoon; Bill Sykes by M. Sullivan; Mr. Brownlow by Anthony DeMare and the Artful Dodger by Jeff Arcuri.

Both are assistant directors of the National CCD Center in Washington, D.C., on the faculty of Catholic University, members of the Religious Education Association, and 1970 delegates to the White House Conference on Children. They are co-authors of the religious textbook series, "Life, Love and Joy."

In a revolutionary departure from the customary seminar or lecture, Father Pfeifer and Sister Janaan will "team teach" for their audience of instructors. In three sessions, they will explore the various facets of the methodology behind catechetics. "Focus on Process" and "Focus on Creativity" are scheduled for the morning, while the afternoon's topic will be "Focus on the Media."

Father Pfeifer's and Sister Janaan's program will be complemented by noontime showings of the films of Father George Torok, known to many diocesan religion teachers for his work on the "Teleketic" film series on the sacraments.

His three 10-minute films, entitled "Revelation," "Resurrection" and "Reconciliation," invite viewers to profess and celebrate their faith. In Father Torok's cinematic portrayal, the events of Christ's life are shown to transcend history and to speak to every man, in every time.

The institute also will offer CCD teachers the opportunity to see what teaching materials and texts are available. Religion textbook publishers have been invited to display their products.

Other events include an address by Father Daniel Holland, director of the Office of Religious Education-CCD, and the celebration of the Eucharist.

The day will conclude with a "graduation ceremony." All those volunteers who have successfully completed the CCD Teacher Training Course will receive diocesan certification as religion teachers in CCD programs.
