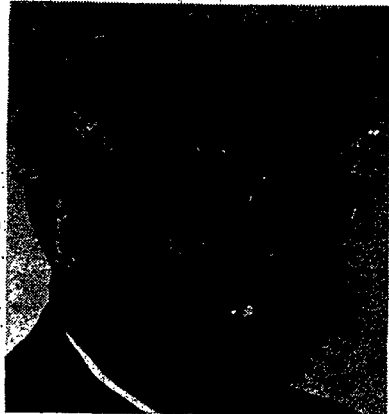
Father Geiger Honored By Town of Gates

Population Expert to Speak Here

Is there really a population time bomb? Famed Australian scientist Dr. Colin Clark will explore this question and other contentions of the Zero Population Growth movement in a public lecture at 8 p.m. Tuesday, May 4, in St. John Fisher College auditorium.

Dr. Clark, whose academic credits include degrees in statistics, economics and agriculture, is the author of several treatises on population problems which have merited the respect and applause of the scientific world. He contends that the problem does not concern overpopulation but population distribution. He says there is enough food to feed the world's population, and that, given the foreseeable progress of agricultural technology, there will be enough food to feed the world population of tomorrow.

Dr. Clark's teaching career has included both the universities of Cambridge and Oxford;

he has also served in the governments of Great Britain and Australia. He is on the faculty of Monash University, Australia, and in May, will begin an extensive speaking tour of the U.S.

His illustrated lecture, sponsored by the Rochester Right to Life Committee, is open to the public. A dollar "good will" donation will be requested at the door.
