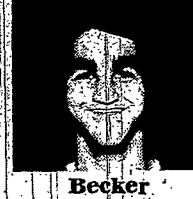
Wrestling—William H. Holland, son of Mrs. Virginia Holland of Irondequoit. He is a

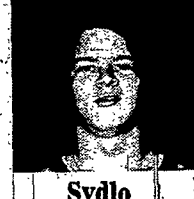

New Principal Named For McQuaid High School

Father Leon J. Hogenkamp, S.J., has been appointed principal of McQuaid Jesuit High School, effective Aug. 15. The announcement was made by Very Rev. Joseph T. Browne, S.J., Provincial of Jesuit Secondary Schools.

At 31, Father Hogenkamp is the youngest principal the school has had. He formerly taught there.

He is a candidate for the doctoral degree at Teachers' College, Columbia University. That's Pannagio and Wanzer, respectively, head basketball coaches at Brockport State and St. John Fisher College.

While Pannagio has the reputation as one of the area's leading basketball talent recruiters, Wanzer isn't letting any grass grow on his court.

Bishop Kearney's Mike Goonan and Webster's Jon Richardson, the latter a fourth team All-State choice while both were first team Greater Rochester, have enrolled at Fisher next fall.

With Fisher going 19-2 (that two is spelled Brockport) this past campaign, and most of the team back next year, add Goonan and Richardson, and you have big trouble for the Cards' opposition. Brockport State included.

Goonan averaged 19.2 points for Kearney, shot 45 per cent from the field, and grabbed almost 400 rebounds last season.

Richardson was second best scorer in the Greater Rochester area with a 21.7 average for the Ridgemen.

JAMES KNIPPER, McQuaid senior from Irondequoit, is the 1971 Rochester Red Wing Batboy.

No. 2 and visiting team batboy is Greg Weston, 16, a junior at Cardinal Mooney.

They were among a dozen finalists in the Red Wing Batboy Contest sponsored by the Times-Union and the Democrat & Chronicle.

Three other boys from diocesan schools were among the final 12. The others were Steve O'Neill of Aquinas; Dick Miller of McQuaid; and Lou Ignatti of Bishop Kearney.

Knipper is a real "veteran"—he was visiting batboy last year for 10 games and even had the Red Wings once.

Knipper is also a veteran performer for his 17 years—13 have been in either Little League or Babe Ruth League

baseball—both as a pitcher and an outfielder.

Ironically, Knipper doesn't play baseball at McQuaid; he likes running and therefore can be found running track for coach Bob Bradley each spring.

Weston has been Mooney's first baseman for the past two years and wasn't sure how his new job would fit in with coach Ed Nietopski's Mooney baseball schedule.

We're sure Nietopski, an old ex-Red Wing shortstop himself, wouldn't present young Weston with any great obstacles.

SPORTS HAVE appeal of course for the very young and very old.

Jon Campo, 10, son of popular basketball official Frank Campo of Irondequoit, won second place in the Niagara District AAU Junior Olympic Wrestling Tournament at Buffalo's Erie County Community College.

Jon pinned his first opponent, won another by disqualification but lost in the finals. His dad, who also officiates lacrosse, is a genuine wrestling aficionado. So's Frank's brother who turns out championship high school mat teams each season down on Long Island.

Horace W. Blackwell, 81, also of Irondequoit, died of a heart attack April 19.

Although most high school athletes probably have never even seen cricket, the English sport occupied Mr. Blackwell for much of his life.

He was secretary to the Rochester Cricket Club for more than 40 years and played cricket himself in England before coming to the U.S. in 1911.

He also was an avid follower of Irondequoit High basketball despite the fact his sons last graduated in the early 1950s.

Those who knew the Burwell, Cambridgeshire, England native, will miss him.
