Capuchin Superior Cites St. Francis' Popularity

Interlaken — The Capuchin superior at St. Fidelis Friary sees the ideas of St. Francis as "the in-thing" today, with stress on "the love and mercy of God, in contrast to His wrath."

Father Bennett Devine, OFM Cap., made the comment in reference to the renewal chapter which the Capuchin Fathers of St. Mary Province convened April 19 at Garrison, N.Y.

Father Bennett, who is also pastor of St. Francis Solanus Church, said the Garrison meetings were a continuation of the official chapter opened last July. Elected and appointed delegates in equal numbers are taking part. He sketched the following background:

Proposals tabled in July will be voted on at this session. Such renewal meetings are in keeping with Vatican II, which called upon religious orders to review and revise rules and constitutions. The discussion of issues at the grass roots level, through delegates, serves to further the ideals of fraternity.

A major issue under consideration is the formation and training for religious vocations. The chapter focused on renewal and examination of religious life. Also under review is how the order can most effectively continue meeting the variety and unique demands of apostolic work today, fulfilling commitment to fraternity and community, and finding financial support.

Through the centuries, the Capuchin fathers have responded to society's needs by involvement in a variety of apostolic work. Today they carry on the teachings of St. Francis of Assisi from the ghettos of New York to missions throughout the world. In this area, they serve as chaplains, conduct spiritual conferences, do mission and parish work.

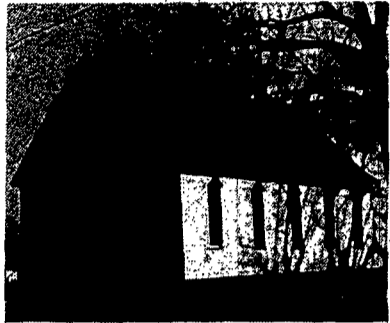

St. Francis Solanus Church was entrusted to the Capuchins in July of 1956 as St. Fidelis Friary is only a few miles away. Until then, St. Francis Solanus church was a mission.

Father Bennett observed:

"The ideas of St. Francis are the in-thing today, with the stress on the love and mercy of God, in contrast to his wrath. It is the more literal living of the Christian gospel expressed in a life of poverty, simplicity, and concern for the outcasts of society. And, in the insistence on brotherhood, fraternity, and working for peace among nations. It is working for the social peace in the world, in the individual, the family, community, and family of nations."

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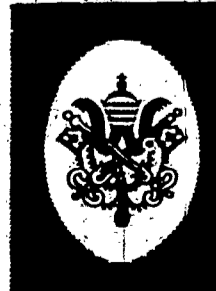
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
