Enrichment Classes Registration Set

The Summer Enrichment Program conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester is now accepting students for its 1971 classes.

This program is open to boys and girls of any Rochester area school who will have completed at least grade 4 by this June and who can benefit from the courses offered.

Geared to in-depth study and experiences designed to awaken awareness, response and creativity, the classes are kept small and informal, and include field trips.

The enrichment program is available at three centers: St. Ambrose School, Empire Blvd.; Nazareth Hall, Raines Pk.; and St. Pius X, Chili Avenue. Subject areas include art, humanities, science, creative expression and sewing.

Classes are held 8:45-10:15, and 10:30-noon every weekday, July 6-30. Students may take on or two classes.

Nazareth Fair Termed Success

Better than 80 people whose higher education has been interrupted attended an all-day open house at Nazareth College last week to see if they were compatible with the academic atmosphere usually around younger students.

And they found they were.

The event was an "academic fair" in which the college, under the direction of the Sisters of St. Joseph, threw open its doors to those whose education was interrupted or those interested in beginning their college education for 'credit or self-enrichment.

More than 40 classes were open to visitors.

According to Sister Barbara Ann, director of continuing education at the school, the day was "very well received." "Many persons were very pleasantly surprised at what we had to offer," she said.

She outlined the needs of the older student as requiring special guidance to assure him he can compete with the younger student.

Sister Barbara Ann described the older "student as being 'scared to death' about re-entering the academic world.

"They can compete," she said, "and teachers like having them in their classes, because of the experiences they bring."

Fisher Paper Wins Honors

For the seventh time in eight years, The Pioneer, bi-monthly newspaper at St. John Fisher College, has been awarded first place in the Columbia scholastic press competition.
