A fund reservation of \$4.6 million in support of a building program for 278 units of housing for students, faculty and staff at Rochester Institute of Technology has been announced by RIT President, Dr. Paul A. Miller.

To be located on a 20-acre site to the southwest of the RIT academic area near East River Road, the complex will include one-bedroom garden apartments, and two- and three-bedroom town houses.

Dr. Miller stated that the housing complex would be spread out over a park-type area, with a targeted completion date of Sept. 15, 1971.

Special entertainment and activities are being planned for a brief show between games.

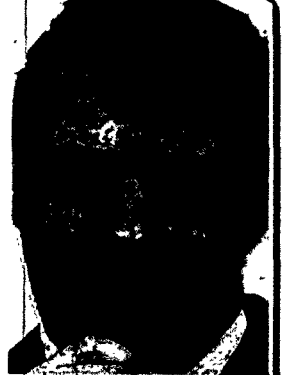
## Methodist Church Dedication Set

## Scholastic Notebook



Say it isn't so, Danny.

"Sorry, but it's true. I've resigned as head football coach at Bishop Kearney High."

Why Danny?

"Well it's been a lot of fun, it's like being paid to play. It's more like prolonged adolescence but now it's time to get out. It's time to try something else."

These are the words of Danny Coughlin, the fiery taskmaster for the past seven seasons of BK football fortunes.

He doesn't leave with any bitterness. He owns a degree in business marketing from Indiana University which, he's never really put to work. "I want to try my hand at a little business," Danny said, while at the same time admitting there's at least one football job in the area, he'd take a crack at if it's ever open again.

"Coaching keeps you young all right. There doesn't seem to be a generation gap when you work with kids every day. In fact half of what people say today about kids just isn't true," Danny said.

He joined BK in 1963. Danny's record last year was 5-2-1 but he didn't go out of his way to produce any "lifetime" totals. "Had a few bad ones," he added.

Danny never flinched from throwing his opinions into the city-county Catholic football hopper. He still doesn't.

"The city will take its lumps next year against the Catholic schools but in the end it will be the best move it ever made. The level of city football will improve just as the level of Catholic basketball improved since the two leagues merged," Dan said.

He said the county league made a very serious mistake by electing not to play Catholic schools after its one year "trial."

"I'm sure they didn't expect to win only one of six games against us. They should have

stayed with us. In the end they too would have improved their overall level of competition.

"Instead they chose to withdraw back into their own cozy little group. They're only kidding themselves. If public and Catholic schools compete in all other sports and not football, the kids know what's up. They have more confidence in themselves than their administrators do."

But for Dan Coughlin it's time to pack up the football sweatshirt and sweatpants, the rain jacket and cleats; it's time to head for new horizons.

As Danny said—"What am I to do when I'm 80? Ask my former players to take up a collection for me?"

He wouldn't have to ask.

AQUINAS INSTITUTE students apparently prayed hard enough and the late Father Carter, long time Aquinas athletic director, can now rest in peace, because the Irish got their "miracle."

Aquinas Stadium, for many months the subject of sale, renting, destruction, apartment houses, politics, etc., etc., talk, isn't coming down after all.

The Cleveland firm which bought the stadium land has announced plans to keep the stadium standing in exchange for a zoning variance from the city to permit it to build its high rise apartments.

Ironically the usual tenants can't use the stadium until other problems, like who's really going to run it, are ironed out.

Because Aquinas, operated by the Basilian Fathers, is tax-exempt, it can not open its gates to the Rochester Lancers this season without facing the possibility of a state crackdown on its tax-exempt status.

Lancer president Pat DiNolfo echoes the sentiments of soccer fans, drum and bugle fans and others when he says it's nice that the stadium will be saved but a shame we can't use it.

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
