

Louis Langie Dies; Long a Diocesan Worker

Louis A. Langie, a civic leader who was prominent in diocesan projects for 30 years, died May 5, 1971, at the age of 74.

He was "a zealous layman always alive to the needs of the church," Bishop L. Hogan observed.

The bishop gave the final benediction after the funeral Mass last Friday at St. John the Evangelist Church, Humboldt St.

Mr. Langie was the first chairman, in 1947, of the diocesan lay committee that promotes Boy Scout programs under Catholic auspices. At the time of his death he was a trustee and chairman of the Otetiana Council's endowment fund committee and a member of the Eagle Board of Review, Boy Scouts of America.

He was born here Dec. 11, 1896. Graduated in 1919 from Georgetown University, he studied law there and at Columbia. Georgetown gave him its John Carroll award for service to college and community. He was regional chairman of university development funds in 1955 and 1969. In 1942, he headed the St. Mary's Hospital building campaign, and in 1957-58, the Community Chest for Rochester and Monroe County.

Retired Bishop James E.

Kearney said of him that "although he was a very busy man in his own business, he never was called upon by any worthwhile activity in this community without giving a most enthusiastic response."

Surviving are his widow, Geraldine; two daughters, Mrs. Patricia Schroth and Sister Virginia Marie, a missionary in the Order of St. Ursula; a son, Louis, Jr.; a brother, Eugene; a sister, Mrs. Antoinette Holohan; and six grandchildren.

Bishop Hogan said:

"The diocese of Rochester is deeply indebted to Mr. Louis Langie and shares with this community a keen feeling of loss in his death. In the name of our laity, religious and clergy I wish to express our sympathy to his family and our promise to pray that Almighty God will reward him for his good life."

"Mr. Langie was a zealous layman. Leader of several financial campaigns for diocesan causes, a strong supporter of his parish, he was always alive to the needs of his Church long before Vatican II emphasized the layman's role. His interest in Catholic scouting and his participation in works of education and social welfare for the diocese were rich contributions to the Church."

He served on the board of directors of Nazareth College, St. Mary's Hospital, St. Ann's Home and the St. Martin de Porres Center. He was a member of the Nocturnal Adoration Society and the Laymen's Retreat League.

Michael Jacula, 89, of Torrington Road, a founding member of St. Josaphat's parish, died May 3, 1971. The funeral was last Thursday at St. Josaphat's.
