Ordination Set For Five Jesuits

Three men from McQuaid Jesuit High School's first graduating class, the class of 1958, will be ordained here May 29 for the Society of Jesus. They are the first Jesuit priests to come out of the school, and the ordination will be the society's first in this diocese.

The class of five includes two men who have taught at McQuaid.

The McQuaid alumni are J. Peter Conroy, Paul W. Nochelski and Alfred E. Caruana, all of Rochester. The former teachers are John F. Walters of Buffalo and Richard Hunt of Syracuse.

Bishop Joseph L. Hogan will ordain them at 3 p.m. this Saturday in St. John the Evangelist Church, 2400 Ridge Road, West.

Rev. Mr. Conroy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph H. Conroy of 438 Arnett Blvd. He entered the Jesuits in 1958 after his graduation from McQuaid. He holds a B.A. in English and an M.A. in Philosophy from Fordham University; a B.D. and a Ph.D. from Woodstock College and is doing graduate work in classics at the University of Toronto.

Rev. Mr. Conroy will celebrate his first Mass on Pentecost Sunday, May 30 in St. Augustine's Church.

Rev. Mr. Nochelski and Rev. Mr. Caruana entered the Jesuits after graduation from McQuaid and both were graduated from Bellarmine College in Plattsburgh, N.Y., where they spent two years in novitiate and two years of college. They were assigned to Loyola Seminary, the College of Philosophy and Letters of Fordham University.

Rev. Mr. Nochelski, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul S. Nochelski of Rochester, earned a B.A. and an M.A. in American history and in June will begin doctoral studies in educational adminis-

tration. He will concelebrate his first Mass Sunday, May 30, at St. Stanislaus Church with Father Robert Hamm of Syracuse.

Rev. Mr. Caruana, son of Dr. Alfred E. and Mrs. Kathryn Caruana of Rochester, was awarded an A.B. in Sociology by Fordham in 1964, an M.A. in Sociology by St. John's University in 1965 and a Ph.D. by

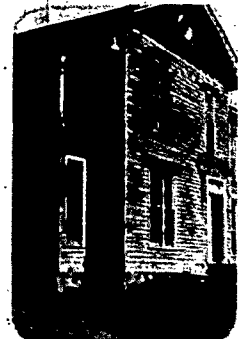
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Ecumenism slowing up?
