serve high school students by combining staff and bringing the groups together under one roof.

Besides more flexibility and a greater scope of activities, the religious educators can use the resources better. The result is additional opportunities on both the social-recreational level and the religious education level—or, as termed by the religious educators, the pre-Gospel and Gospel levels.

As they see it, most of the youths will be very much pre-Gospel, that is, they have not reached the point of being concerned with the message of the Gospels; their concerns are social and have to do with their

physical and emotional maturing to adulthood.

Another smaller group will be interested in discussion and questioning of the meaning of Christianity and its relation to the individual's life. The educators are quick to point out, however, that these pre-Gospel and Gospel groups are not hard and fast, as within each individual there is a need for both social and spiritual activity.

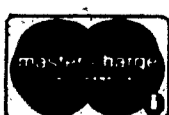

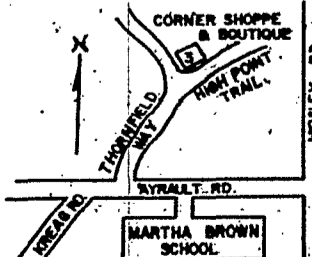

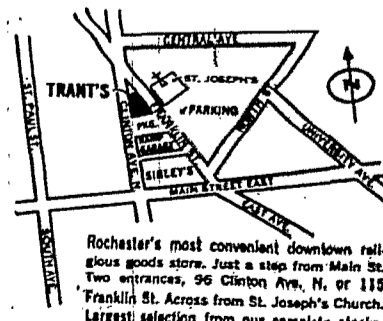
